To All Whom it May Concern.

THE undersigned having been appointed, by the Governor General in Council, Inspector of Leather and of Raw Hides for the Division of Charlottetown, which comprises the whole of Prince Edward Island, notice is hereby given that on and after this date I will be prepared to examine and inspect all Raw Hides and Leather, at the Shop formerly occupied by David Wilson, Esq., Richmond Street, opposite London House.

Special attention is called to the 6th and 9th section of the General Inspection Act 1874, which are as follows:—

96. The Inspection of Raw Hides shall be compulsory at every place where an Inspector or Deputy Inspector has been appointed; and every Raw Hide sold, offered for sale or exported, offered for export or laden in any vehicle or vessel for the purpose of being exported, and which has not been first inspected and stamped or marked as herein required, shall be forfeited; and the person so selling or offering for sale or exporting the same, shall incur a penalty of one dollar for every Hide so sold, offered for sale, or exported.

97. The expression "Raw Hides" shall mean and include all untanned or uncurried skins commonly used in the manufacture of Leather.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.

The appointment of Hon. James Cockburn as Commissioner to codify Dominion statutes is gazetted.

The Canada Temperance Act is proclaimed in force in the County of Hants.

The deposits in the Post Office Savings Bank for October amounted to \$550,880 and withdrawals \$239,670. The balance at the credit of depositors on Oct. 31st was \$7,196,373.

The total value of goods exported from the Dominion during October was \$13,628,513, of which \$13,163,831 was the produce of Canada.

Notice is given of intended applications to Parliament, for acts of incorporation for the Manitoba Bank, the Northwestern Bank, the St. Croix Bridge Company, the Dominion Fire and Marine Insurance Company, Grand Central Station Company, Canada Provident Association, Ontario and Quebec Railway Company, and the Ottawa, Waddington and New York Railway Company.

A general order is published to the effect that in the event of a sufficient number of officers of infantry not coming forward for admission to a school of military instruction, permission is given to officers of infantry corps to make up the number to which a school is limited.

The Canada Pacific Railway land grant five per cent. bonds have been placed on the market for sale by the Bank of Montreal at par.

EUROPEAN.

DUBLIN, Nov. 27.

Proceedings at the forthcoming Assizes are anticipated with extraordinary interest. It is reported the Crown Council has been instructed to put forward early all cases of Agrarian crime in which evidence is perfectly clear, and that in the event of acquittals or disagreements in those cases, the Crown Counsel are to apply for adjournment of Assizes, pending legislation, which would take the form of appointment of a tribunal, consisting of the Chairman of Quarter Sessions and three Stipendiary Magistrates, with full power to try summarily all offences except murder.

VIENNA, Nov. 27.

Colliers in Ostran coal mines, belonging to the Northern Railway, the largest mines in Austria, are on a strike. At last accounts the strike was becoming serious. Twelve hundred men have already struck. It is feared the miners of large neighboring pits will join them.

LONDON, Nov. 27.

A heavy gale prevailed throughout the United Kingdom on Saturday and Sunday, doing serious damage to property. Wrecks occurred on various parts of the coast.

LONDON, Nov. 27.

It is stated Lefroy has fully confessed to the murder of Gold also of Lieut. Roper—murdered in Chatham Barracks some time ago.

LONDON, Nov. 27.

Government has renewed for a year the prohibition of importation of pork from the United States and several European countries.

FALMOUTH, Nov. 27.

The steamer "Gumetra," from Boston Nov. 12 for London, has arrived. She encountered terrific weather. Her decks were swept, boats smashed, and all the cattle except 15 head were washed overboard.

UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, Nov. 27.

Father Sheehy and T. M. Healy, M. P., addressed an immense audience in the Boston Theatre, to-night, under the auspices of the Land League. Governor Long presided, and made an address of sympathy with the Irish movement. Mayor Prince was also upon the platform.

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
