VICTORY!

Prince Edward re-elects the Conservative by a largely increased Majority.

Lennox changes a Grit Majority of 57 into a Tory Majority of 31.

Splendid Prospects.

OTTAWA, Feb. 5. A splendid victory in Prince Edward by an increased majority of 213 and the capture of Lennox from the Grits with a majority of 31, comprises the Government's day's work in Ontario yesterday.

Hon. Mr. Patterson's nomination in West Huron has quite demoralized the Grit party in that constituency, and his election on the 23rd is fully conceded by all who know the riding. Mr. Murray of Pontiac, has been unseated, and he has no hope of being re-elected.

Shooting Affray. MONTREAL, Feb. 5.

A driver named Ignace Bestien, in the employ of Sharpe and Burton, was shot by Watchman Moore and it is feared that he will die. It is said, however, that Bestien was the aggressor.

Mercier and Langlais. QUEBEC, Feb. 5.

It is stated on excellent authority that Mercier and J. B. Langlais will be arrested within this week, charged with conspiracy to defraud the Provincial Treasury.

Fatal Collision. ANTWERP, Feb. 5.

The French steamer at St. Andre reported off Fecamp, collided with the Danish brig Thor. All the crew of the Thor were drowned, except a boy.

Ice Adrift. BERLIN, Feb. 5.

Thirty barges were torn from their moorings yesterday by drift ice. At Breslau several barges sank and 40 persons were drowned.

Fatal Fever. NEW YORK, Feb. 5.

Steamer Buffon from Santos arrived yesterday. While at Santos the captain and six of the crew died of yellow fever.

Killed By a Bull. WOODBRIDGE, Ont., Feb. 5.

Robert Kerr, aged 16 years, was fatally gored by a bull yesterday.

News Notes.

The second congress of the chambers of commerce of the British empire is to be held in London in June.

It seems that the Atlantic is higher than the Pacific, but the difference in level is not more than six and one half feet.

The phonograph is now used in hospitals for the purpose of studying the auditory characteristics of pulmonary diseases.

There are in the world 147 educational institutions called universities. The largest is in Paris, the next in Vienna and the third in Berlin.

Experiments show that a person speaking in the open air can be heard equally as well at a distance of 100 feet in front, 75 on each side and 30 behind.

The Indians enlisted out west as cavalry troops are praised by the army officers who have recently inspected them, who say that they are easily disciplined, learn the drill readily, and soon acquire the esprit de corps. The enlisted Indians learn the arts of civilization during their term of service. These views are sustained by the Secretary of War.

The speaker of the House of Commons has a salary of \$25,000, and is entitled to a retiring pension of \$20,000. It is only when he is a pensioner, however, that he has any benefit out of his allowance.
