Among the producers sending dual purpose Shorthorns, will be Keith Barrett, Belmont; Daniel Jewell, North River; Stanley Hurry, Winsloe, and Stirling Wood, Mt. Herbert.

Guerneys will be exhibited by Harold Palmer, Kensington; Roy Younger, Harrison Green; and Tyrus Holmes, all of Kingston, and Eric Hurry, North River.

Junior Boswell, Charlottetown will send an exhibit of Jerseys.

Hereford will be exhibited by Gordon Matheson, Hunter River, and Fulton Sanderson and Son of North River.

A large number of exhibitors will be sent to the fair. Exhibiting will be Parker Newson, Kingston; Eric Leard, Winsloe; Roy Dickson, New Glasgow; John Thompson and Wilfred Stewart, both of Freshford; Cyril Jones, Pownal, and Lewis brothers, York.

Asyrhite exhibits are being lined up by A. MacFie, a 4 and 5 sons, East Royalty, Almond Wood and S. O. a. Marshfield, and Keith Boswell, Victoria.

Montague Discusses Sewer Lines Problem

Montague's sewerage situation was again the focus at last night's meeting of the town council. The matter was brought to the attention of the council by Douglas MacGowan, M.L.A., who was seeking information in regard to his own sewer line. He strongly urged the town to take over this line and for the council to make up its own mind to a method of operation.

At the present time the town owns only one sewer line but has been making necessary repairs to several of the privately-owned sewer lines and billing the users for these repairs.

Coun. A. E. Ings said he felt it was time the town took over all existing lines, maintained them and charged a nominal fee to cover the cost of the upkeep. He believed this would gradually build up a cash surplus which could be used to replace old sewer lines or build new ones.

A letter from the provincial council on the subject of public minded assistance and support to help cover the litter problem was taken up by the town. The town has taken steps in recent years to try and control this problem through the town by placing trash cans throughout the town.

This has been done with the assistance of public minded merchants and although not doing all that could be desired it has helped.

It was pointed out that fines can be imposed on anyone throwing litter on the streets and this would be done. The C.W.L. pointed out the necessity of some type of program to help keep the province's roads, towns and villages clear for the centennial year.

Funeral Held For W.B. Creed At Highfield And Dundas UCs

The funeral for William Bentley Creed, Highfield, was held yesterday from the United Churches at Highfield and Dundas streets, services being held in both churches because of the close association Mr. Creed had with them during his lifetime.

Mr. Creed was born at Albion, P.E.I., in 1892, the son of George Creed and his wife, the former Annie MacDonald of Forest Hill who died only last year.

He enlisted in the Kings County Siege Battery in the First Great War, was later transferred to the 25th Infantry Battalion, was gassed in France and discharged in 1920.

His other main interest was music and his bass voice added greatly to the service of worship in the churches at Dundas and Highfield. He was also a member of the Charlottetown M.E. Church which was organized several years ago.

Mr. Creed was married to Elizabeth Alice Pittman, Lamaline, Newfoundland, who survives. A son, Murray Creed, a television producer in Toronto, is in charge of agriculture and fisheries television productions across the country. Another son, Sonny, died in infancy.

The funeral was held from the Cutcliffe Funeral Home to Highfield United Church where service was conducted by Rev. T. R. Goudge assisted by Rev. F. H. Leathe, pastor of the M.E. Church. The hymn sung was "Forever With The Lord".
