Brief Business Session

In a brief business session dealing with finances it was agreed that out of town members of the Executive coming to this city for regularly called meetings of the Executive should be reimbursed for their expenses. It was explained by Chairman Simons that meetings of the Executive held during the late fall and winter months meant that those attending had to stay overnight. An honorarium of \$100 a year was also voted the secretary treasurer because of the vast amount of work involved in the position.

Freighter Is Refloated

HALIFAX, May 12 - (CP) - The freighter Blue Prince, grounded since Sunday morning at Malagaish, N. S. with a cargo including livestock, was refloated at high water today, Foundation Maritime reported here.

The tug Rocky River refloated the 690-ton freighter out of Charlottetown, at 9:15 a. m. ADT. The Blue Prince headed for inspection at the Pictou Shipyards.

The Government icebreaker Saurel and the tug Glenlivet II failed in earlier attempts to haul the freighter to deep water. Included in the Blue Prince's cargo were hundreds of pigs, cows and calves.

Continued from page 1 emment, the municipalities and the people who elected them and advised against planning too much for the immediate future instead of for many years ahead.

There were three highly important components necessary before success would come to the planning Association. They were: research, education and action. What was needed to obtain them was leadership and then initiative of local people. While the speaker thought the exchange of information was vital and that we should follow what goes on in other Provinces, nevertheless he said we should not just grab at the working plans of others and try to put them into operation here.

Public Interest Necessary

Dr. MacKinnon said public interest was absolutely essential and the leaders should take pride in their community and their planning should offer encouragement to young people.

Planning, he stated, should not relate merely to utility, but should be concerned with beauty as well. Here we have natural locations with beautiful harbors, but there should be an effort made to increase the beauty of the towns. As an example he mentioned the public squares of this city which he thought could be made into more beautiful places in which children could play.

The speakers noted that the really valuable citizen goes out and does a lot to better his community, but at the same time there were some overly enthusiastic ones who only did harm to a project. He expressed approval of remarks made recently at a Rotary Club luncheon by Mayor J.D. Stewart who noted that citizens here were not always working together for the betterment of the city as were

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the people of Summerside. This Division of the Community Planning Association through its work and its association with the National body can do a vast amount of good for Prince Edward Island, he concluded, but added that patience, investigation and hard work would be needed.

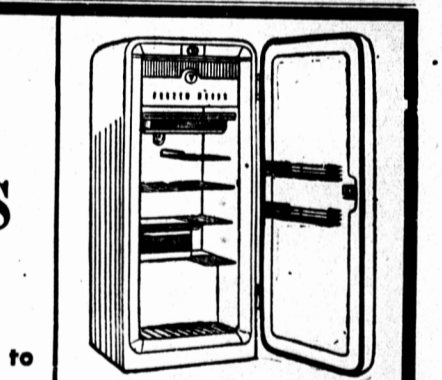
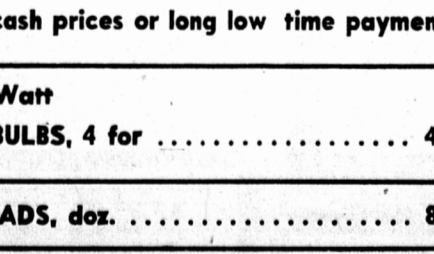
