Russia Captures World Ch Ship

The victory was Russia's sixth against one loss. To break Sweden's 10-year hockey championship Sunday by a single goal in the goal of the 16 games in world tournament history.

The high-powered Russians defeated Canada 4-2 and pulled up just enough goals in the final reckoning to snap a points drought of 10 years and win the title for the second time.

The defending champion Soviet national team defeated the Czechoslovakia 3-2.

That defeat left Sweden with 10 points, Czechoslovakia 8, Canada and Finland — country victors — at the top spot. The teams played by Russia and Sweden against East Germany, West Germany and the United States did not come into the record book on goal difference.

The Soviets barely made it into the fifth place. Finland clinched the fifth spot with a 2-1 win against goal record of the lower four in the championship division.

Czechoslovakia's win over Sweden came on their second period goal after Sweden had gone ahead 1-0 in the first period. The Czechs finished their game with only one loss and one tie for 11 points.

Canada wound up fourth, its worst showing since it won the Olympic hockey history dating back to the first world tournament at Antwerp, Belgium, in 1920.

The Smokeaters finished with two ties and one loss in a tie against Czechoslovakia for nine points. The last four countries in the bracket each had three points.
