

Bob Swift, Manager-Coach Of Detroit Tigers, Dies

DETROIT (AP)—Bob Swift, who three times posted winning records as an acting American League baseball manager but never won the job permanently, died in hospital Monday.

Swift, 51, who took over Detroit Tigers twice in the last two years when manager Charlie Dressen suffered heart attacks, was stricken shortly after the All Star game with what was thought to be a stomach ailment.

It was later diagnosed as lung cancer.

When Harry Craft fell ill at Kansas City in 1959, Swift, a coach, was called to manage the Athletics. He directed Kansas City to 10 straight victories and 13 out of 15.

PASSED OVER

When they let Craft go, I thought I would get the first crack at the job," Swift once said. But the Athletics picked Bob Elliott.

Swift moved to Washington where he coached for a year, then returned to the Tiger organization as manager of the Duluth team in 1961.

Dressen suffered a heart attack in 1965 and Swift took over during spring training. The Tigers posted a 24-18 record before Dressen returned.

Last May, Dressen suffered his second heart attack and Swift again became manager. He was 32-25 before being sidelined by illness himself.

Swift caught 1,000 major league games in spite of a .231 batting average. He played with the old St. Louis Browns and Philadelphia Athletics, plus the Tigers.

HELPED WIN PENNANT

In 1945, Swift shared the catching duties with Paul Richards on the Tigers last pennant winning team.

Frank Saft took over the Tiger helm when Swift became ill this summer. Dressen died during the season and the Tigers finished in last place.

Speedy Rodney Is UN Favorite

YONKERS, N.Y. (AP)—Speedy Rodney, the speedy defending champion and one of four entries representing the United States, was established as 8-to-5 favorite Monday to win the \$100,000 United Nations Trot at Yonkers Raceway tonight.

Speedy Rodney, owned by John and Wayne Crey of Mineral Point, Wis. and Robert Mann of Elkhorn, Wis., will open from the No. 4 post position and will have Del Insko in the sulky.

The 1 1/2-mile feature, for which first money is \$50,000, will close Yonkers Raceway's 144-night season.

Earl Laird, Noble Victory and Lord Gordon also will carry the hopes for a sixth straight U.S. victory. The other challengers are Roquepine and Short Stop of France and Apex Hanover and Osman of Russia.

Stanley Dancer will rein Noble Victory, the biggest money winner among the eight starters. The four-year-old has earned \$522,391 and last month set a world record for the mile with a clocking of 1:53 3-5.

Roquepine, the No. 1 hope among the foreign entries, is recognized abroad as Europe's speediest trotter.

The Soviet Union's Apex Hanover and France's Short Stop are former U.S.-owned trotters. Maria Burdova, a woman driver from Moscow, will pilot Apex Hanover while Billy Houghton will rein Short Stop.

Heavy weight Sells Shares In Himself For Financing

TORONTO (CP)—These shares will never be listed on the stock exchange but, unlike some of today's investors, anyone who buys will have a fighting chance of realizing some return.

Frankie Bullard Jr., a 21-year-old Toronto heavyweight boxer, is selling 100 shares in himself at \$100 each to raise enough money to make fighting a full-time occupation.

Bullard, six feet and 195 pounds, has a 7-1 won-lost record with five knockouts as a professional. He was 38-2 as an amateur.

The idea of selling shares belongs to Bullard's father, Frank Bullard Sr., an amateur middleweight around Toronto 25 years ago.

TIME TO TRAIN

Young Bullard, married and the father of an 18-month-old boy, found it difficult to hold a job as a shipping clerk and train as much as he wanted. So his dad went into a huddle with manager Irv Ungerman and Toronto lawyer John Pol-

lock and worked out the financial details.

A sell-out of shares would give the company, known as Nonpareil Promotions and directed by Ungerman and the two Bullards, \$10,000 to get Frankie through the first year. Money made in purses would be added to the kitty. Shareholders can opt out at the end of the first, second or third year. Otherwise, they may be asked to pony up more funds to keep Bullard solvent.

Bullard draws only his weekly salary the first year but then the financial picture brightens. He gets his salary and 40 per cent of whatever is left in the kitty. Out of the 40 per cent, his backers invest 10 per cent for him in a trust fund he can't dip into for five years.

25 SHARES SOLD

His salary stays the same the third year and if there's money in the pot again, he keeps 50 per cent with 10 per cent going into trust.

If Bullard's backers string along with him after three

years, his salary stops but he keeps 50 per cent of his purses, minus 10 per cent for the trust account.

"We've sold 25 shares already," said Ungerman, who also manages Canadian heavyweight champion George Chuvalo, "but there'll probably be only 50 shareholders or less the first year."

Bullard serves as a sparring partner for Chuvalo and Ungerman sees him as a possible successor to George, who lost decisions to Clay and World Boxing Association champion Ernie Terrell during the last 18 months.

"If Chuvalo were to retire within two or three years, I think Bullard would be the top contender for his Canadian title. Once Bullard has the Canadian title, he gets recognition in the United States and it opens a lot of doors for him."

But Ungerman said Bullard can't take forever making the big time.

"At the end of the third year, the kid has to make it or he's probably through."

ONLY LOST ONE GAME

Meanwhile, the Rough Riders, with a record of 11-1 and these

first conference title since 1961, can relax for two weeks while Montreal and Hamilton battle it out.

Ottawa's next game is in Toronto Sunday and although the Argos aren't expected to provide much trouble, Rough Rider coach Frank Clair remains pessimistic.

However, Clair has been worried all season while the Rough Riders were mowing down the opposition and establishing themselves as the class of the Canadian Football League.
