Maple Breton MP Stresses Cornerstone Industries

OTTAWA (CP)—An appeal for federal help in maintaining the "cornerstone industries" of coal and steel in Nova Scotia was made in the Commons Monday by Malcolm MacInnis (NDP—Maple Breton South).

The Atlantic provinces' economy "cannot be successful unless we protect the existing basic industries of Nova Scotia—coal and steel," said Mr. MacInnis, whose constituency includes the coal-steel district of Sydney, N.S.

He spoke in opening a hour-long debate on a resolution in which he proposed "a long-range, positive and comprehensive program for economic development of the Atlantic provinces. The resolution was talked out without coming to a vote.
