GREAT CRY—BUT LITTLE WOOL.

In view of the fact, recognized and admitted by everyone, that if it were not for her dairy products, established under the auspices of the Conservative Government, Prince Edward Island would now be financially "in a very bad way." The Patriot's borrowed and erroneous figures to prove that the country at large is highly favored by the present administration are positively insulting to the intelligence of farmers and men of business. No doubt we are doing more business. Going to the store to buy flour and seed grain, as well as the necessaries of life, has kept the people pretty busy this spring; and importing those necessaries from abroad has given employment to steamers and trading vessels, to merchants and middlemen. But no one who reflects that the farmer must pay for all will say that this Province is profiting by the increased trade.

As it is in this Province so it is, in a modified form, all over Canada. The people are importing more than they are exporting, buying more than they are selling, paying more taxes and going deeper into debt. There is a stir; but not much real national prosperity.

For what prosperity there may be the present Government is not at all to be thanked. Our people are working hard under increasingly difficult conditions; and if any of them are making headway they are doing so in spite of the Government, not by its aid. The Patriot's list to the contrary notwithstanding, prices generally have advanced a long way since the Liberal Government took office. Barbed wire fencing, for instance, was selling a year two ago at two and a quarter cents, and now it is selling at three cents; and all articles of a like description are higher in price in like proportion. It is possible that the Patriot's statement as to "reaping hooks" may be true; but farmers, in this Province, at least, do not use many reaping hooks now-a-days. The articles in general use for which the farmers have not now to pay more than formerly are those in respect to which the Government have in violation of their pre-election "principles," increased the protective duty and which are manufactured in our own country.

The failure of the Government to meet the expectation that an ocean steamship would leave Charlottetown for Liverpool early this spring has brought loss and disappointment to many farmers and men of business. Indeed disappointment with the Liberal Government is the prevailing feeling throughout the country.

At Sir John's Grave.

KINGSTON, June 7.—The MacDonald club in accordance with its annual custom, today visited Cataragus cemetery and decorated the grave of the late Sir John MacDonald. There was also a wreath from the Conservative members of Parliament. Several addresses were delivered.

Diseased Doukhobors.

OTTAWA, June 7.—The minister of agriculture has received this evening a despatch from Dr. Montzambert, at Gros-Isle, stating that on account of disease among Doukhobors just arrived, it would be necessary to detain the whole party of 2,000 in quarantine. The nature of the disease is not stated. A Quebec report says that five deaths occurred on the passage.

The Andree Message.

CHRISTIANIA, June 7.—The slip of paper found inside the cork buoy picked up by two boys on May 14th last on the north coast of Iceland was inscribed: "Drifting buoy number 7. This buoy from Andree's balloon, July 7, 1897, 10 15° Greenwich time, 85 north 25 east. We are an altitude of 600 metres. All well, (Signed) Andree, Strindberg, Froenckel." The balloon thus had only travelled seven hours, fifty minutes when the buoy was thrown out.

Plague in Egypt.

CAIRO, Egypt, June 7.—The total number of plague sufferers at Alexandria is placed at 14, of which two have died. Four new cases were reported yesterday but no new cases have been reported elsewhere.

Bills Disallowed.

OTTAWA, June 7.—Within four days of the time limit under the constitution, the two Acts of the British Columbia Legislature, prohibiting Japanese and Chinese from being employed on any public work in that province executed under provincial charter have been disallowed. One is a general statute embodying the foregoing principle, the other is an Act relating to tramways, which also places a ban upon the Celestial and the Japs. The action of the Government is the direct outcome of the request of the Imperial authorities, as Japan had the legislation, strongly protested against, and the interests of Britain in the East will best be maintained by holding the friendship of the Japanese authorities. In the opinion of the Home authorities the legislation would also be detrimental to the best interests of Canada. What Japan protested against was the insult which the Act placed upon its people in including them with the Chinese as being an undesirable class to permit in the country.

Prisoner Discharged.

LONDON, June 7.—Welsely Richard, the commission agent who was arrested at the Bank of England, May 29, while attempting to cash three £100 notes, which were stolen in January last at Paris bank, was discharged today, the evidence against him being insufficient. Richards claims he had received the notes at the New Market races.

HOW TO GET TO CHARLOTTETOWN

The steamer Halifax leaves Boston for Charlottetown every Saturday at noon and will be due at Charlottetown on Monday night. On the following Tuesday at one she will leave on return to Boston. Halifax and Port Hawkesbury are called at every trip. Passengers may take the steamer at any of the ports mentioned. The Halifax will be supplemented by the Grand Duchess later in the season.

The steamer City of Ghent plies between Halifax and Charlottetown each week, calling at several ports en route. She is due here every Thursday.

The steamers Coban, Bonavista, Campana, Tiber and Polino, of Montreal, also make Charlottetown a port of call.

Passengers for this Province coming by way of Picton are brought to Charlottetown by the steamer Princess. Those coming by way of Point Du Chene connect with the steamer Northumberland, and may come through to Charlottetown by the mail special which leaves Summerside each evening immediately after the steamer reaches that port.

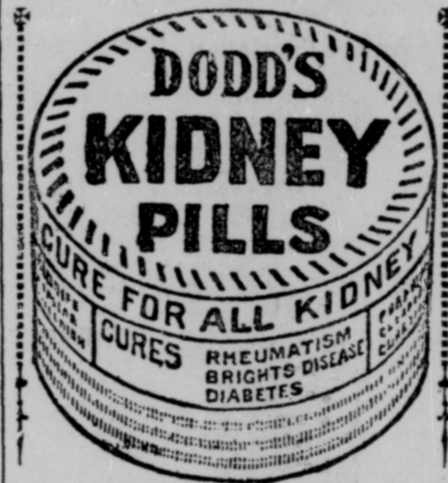
