TRADE RETURNS.

A Good Showing.

Large Increase of Commerce.

OTTAWA, July 23.

The trade returns for the fiscal year just ended are not yet completed, but the preliminary returns show the following satisfactory results as compared with the returns of previous years: Imports have increased 3,000,000, or two and three quarter per cent.; exports have increased over \$15,000,000, or sixteen per cent.; the aggregate trade of the country has increased \$18,000,000.

In 1891, the imports exceeded exports by 2 1/2 per cent.; this year the balance of trade is the other way by \$3,000,000. The duty collected shows a decrease of nearly \$3,000,000 or 13 per cent. The rate of duty the previous year was 2 1/2 per cent.; last year it was only 17.13 per cent.

Two Thousand Killed.

Awful Destitution.

THE HAGUE, July 23.

Tel-grams from Batavia confirm the recent accounts of the awful destitution caused on Great Sangir Island, belonging to Holland, by the volcanic eruption of July 17. Two thousand inhabitants were killed.

An Imperial Loan.

LONDON, July 23.

The Right Hon. Geo. J. Goschen, Chancellor of the Exchequer, had a conference yesterday with Lord Knutsford, the Colonial Secretary, to arrange for the issuing of an Imperial loan to Newfoundland to relieve the sufferers by the St. John's fire.

MONCTON, July 23.

Dr. Weldon's action for libel against the Moncton Transcript has been concluded, with a verdict for the plaintiff. The jury awarded him \$50 and costs.

General Telegraphic News.

CALGARY, N. W. T., July 20.—The Maritime Province delegates arrived here this evening from Edmonton. They express themselves in terms of the most unstinted praise of the Edmonton District and say that on the whole they were more than pleased with British Columbia and what they saw of Manitoba. They think Edmonton the finest district and prophesy that before ten years Alberta will contain a population of 250,000. One delegate grew enthusiastic in speaking of northern Alberta and said he never saw or expected to see a country where the conditions were so favorable to mixed farming. Three of the party were down to Nelson, B. C., and were surprised at the growth of that place and the richness of the mineral deposits. They predict a great future for the Kootenay mining district. There are two large delegations from Nebraska and Dakota now in Edmonton, and they speak of the country in a way that would be a revelation to many eastern people who have no faith in the future of Canada. They leave for Regina in the morning.

DUBLIN, July 21.—There was a bloody riot in New Tipperary to-day as a consequence of the excitement over the elections. Several Parnellites made an attack on a party of anti-Parnellites in the street, and clubs and fists were freely used. Both sides added to their numbers, and when the police arrived a score or more of the combatants lay on the ground unconscious; the officers used their clubs vigorously, and the crowd was partly dispersed. Two hours afterwards the worse element of both factions again began rioting through the town. Men not concerned in the fight were overpowered and maltreated, and several men who fled to their homes for protection were dragged out and knocked about in the street. Their houses were ransacked, windows and doors knocked out, and furniture smashed or thrown into the street. Women and children were driven out and sent crying and screaming to the outskirts of the town. Finally the police got the mob under control, after nearly an hour of hard fighting. Seventeen of the rioters were seriously injured.
