**The Savings Bank at Summerside.**

This institution was established a year ago. Already two hundred and thirty-six accounts have been opened, while \$56,034.33 have been deposited, and \$10,090.00 withdrawn. So that the balance on hand at the end of the fiscal year (June 30) was \$45,944.33.

The amounts of the deposits range from \$1 to \$3,000; and the depositors include persons from all classes in the community—shop and office boys, dealers, and farmers. Several farmers have each deposited as much money as the bank will take from any one customer.

No doubt, the deposits will continue to increase as the people continue to prosper; and it is very well that the people have at hand a means of cultivating habits of saving. The judicious investment of money in improved stock, etc., is of course better than putting it in a Savings Bank. But next to that, for farmers who are not well up to the tricks of trade, the Savings Bank offers the best, because the safest way of investment. We hope to see a Savings Bank at Souris and Alberton next year.

**Camp Hunter.**

The news from the front, detailed by THE EXAMINER'S correspondent, is satisfactory. It appears that the field, though commanding and picturesque, is not very well suited for drilling purposes. But their soldiers must not expect to find things easy; and it is well that our militia should be accustomed to perform their evolutions on the rough as well as on the smooth—the slope of a hill as well as on the level plateau. Climbing the hillsides will try the muscle of our sturdy infantry, and "rushing down the steep decline" will test the horsemanship of their chief officers, though it would be too bad to see any one of them, merely for the sake of drill, ducked in the leaden millpond of the valley.

The men will continue in camp for twelve days; and though many of them are now but raw recruits, a venture the prediction that they will give a good account of themselves at the sham fight, which will take place just before the camp is broken up. The change, exercise, recreation and discipline in the open country air cannot fail to greatly benefit all at the camp—especially those who reside in the city.

A despatch from London says that Henry George, author of "Progress and Poverty," has an article in the July number of the *Nineteenth Century*, which lauds up American institutions. Mr. George contends that the political corruption of the United States does not spring from the excess, but from the deficiency of democracy. He makes a very violent attack upon the Duke of Argyll, and all holders of landed estate in Scotland, whom he advises to emigrate that their lands may be occupied by ditchers and delvers. He has a good deal to say about women chained to factory labor, and children who have to work instead of pick berries and wild flowers in heather dells, and of young girls who have to go prowling the streets and so forth.

**Camp Hunter.**

ON THE WAY—A COMMANDING POSITION TAKEN UP—THEY STRUCK—EARTHWORKS THROWN UP—THE YOUNG MEN AT DRILL.

From the Examiner's Correspondent in Camp.

HUNTER RIVER, July 1, 1884.

After a pleasant ride on our Island Railway, enlivened with music from the 82nd Battalion Band, we arrived at Hunter River Station about 11.30, and immediately marched into Camp.

The Camp is situated on rising ground, about half a mile west of Hunter River Station. The view from the Camp is commanding and striking, but the ground is nothing like as pleasant or suitable for camp purposes as at Milton, where we encamped last year, and I am afraid will be found hard on the men for drilling purposes.

The men all came into camp in good order, the Scott Act being strictly observed, all of the men coming in perfectly sober, and the first night in camp being marked by the good order that prevailed.

On account of orders from Ottawa, Lieut.-Col. Taylor (who arrived in the city from Halifax on Monday evening to take command of the camp) had to proceed West with all speed; and the camp was then placed under command of Lieut.-Col. Beer, he being the senior officer.

By reference to another column it will be noticed that an interesting event took place yesterday at Mount Stewart. We refer to the marriage of Mr. Daniel Davies, junior, (son of Hon. Benj. Davies) and Miss Annie Amelia Lochhead. At twelve o'clock a large number of guests left Charlottetown by special train to attend the marriage, and having arrived at Mount Stewart proceeded to the Presbyterian Church where they were joined by numerous other guests from Mount Stewart and surroundings. At the Church the bride was attended by Miss L. McLennan and Miss M. Dawson as bridesmaids, and the groom had for his best men, Mr. T. C. Robins and Mr. George Davies. The bridal party looked remarkably well. The marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. W. R. Frame, assisted by Rev. J. McLeod. After the marriage the party repaired to the residence of the Rev. Mr. Frame, where the bride and groom received the congratulations of their friends, and the party partook of a very substantial dejeuner. The presents were numerous and valuable. The happy couple took their departure by the Eastern train for Summerside, en route for St. Paul, Minnesota. We wish them a long and happy life in their future home. A pleasing incident in connection with the marriage was the presentation to the bride, by James Ross Esq., of an elegant family Bible, bound in Morocco, the gift of the ladies of the congregation of Mount Stewart and West St. Peter's, as a token of their esteem and affection.

Suicide by Hanging.

James St. C. Moore, Esq., Coroner for Queen's Co., yesterday held an inquest in view of the body of Mrs. Catherine Stewart, wife of Mr. Donald Stewart, Belle Creek. From the evidence taken at the inquest we learn that Mrs. Stewart committed the rash act while laboring under a fit of temporary insanity. She had been of unsound mind for some time, and her increasing lunacy was particularly noticeable during the past three weeks. Yesterday morning her husband went fishing, by her request. In his absence she sent her children away from home and then went to the barn, where she fastened a rope around a beam, adjusted a noose around her neck, covered her face, and slipped from the barn loft into eternity. Between ten and eleven o'clock in the forenoon, one of her children—a little girl—returned to her home. She missed her mother and at once went in search of her. Not finding her, she informed the neighbors, who, on searching the barn, found the unfortunate woman hanging to the beam, cold and dead. The jury returned the following verdict:— "That the deceased Mrs. Stewart came to her death by going up on the barn loft and securing the rope that caused her death on the beam, and on her neck, and thus lowered herself down through the loft in another part of the barn."
