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Let's Talk It Over

In recent months such eminent writers as Shakespeare, Emily Dickenson, and a few others have been held up as examples of what may be done if correct forms and grammatical exactitude are sacrificed to originality and free expression of thought. There is little question but some of the great writers broke grammar text rules and yet stood out as titans in the art of weaving words into thoughts.

In the realm of baseball, if we may make such a comparison, the great Al Simmons broke every rule in the baseball book by his manner of standing at the plate to hit a ball. His stance was considered by exponents of sound baseball practice to be "impossible", and yet Simmons was one of the greatest hitters that baseball has produced. Gil MacDougald of the present Yankees stands, to use a common baseball phrase, "with one foot in the water-bucket". Yet MacDougald is always dangerous waving that bat. Still no coach advises the young batter to copy the peculiar stances of Simmons or MacDougald. They are instructed to stand at the plate in the manner which seems to be best for 95% or more of all batters.

Perhaps teachers of grammar should do likewise. Teach their pupils the formal rules of grammar, and let the few geniuses among them develop their own peculiar patterns as they flower into greatness. After all, genius and eccentricity are closely related qualities.

We think, however, that formal grammar can be, and sometimes is over-emphasized in teaching English. Instead of being a guide to correct and forceful English expression, it becomes an end in itself, a sort of mental gymnastic, and pupils who can analyze, parse, and name tenses and moods with glib facility, are sometimes pretty helpless when they attempt to write even a friendly letter. 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Offer Trotting Association \$115,470 Towards Building

A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council yesterday afternoon unanimously approved a resolution, which subject to acceptance by the Summerside Trotting Association will provide the Association with \$115,470, interest free, for the construction of an indoor arena to be used for several purposes including a skating rink with artificial ice, a community youth center and agricultural exhibitions.

The Town of Summerside will hold shares in the new area to the value of \$50,000 while the remaining \$65,470 which the Town will borrow from the Government and relend to the Association will be secured by a first mortgage on the building and will be repayable in equal annual payments over a period of ten years.

The Town will also supply free water, light, and tax exemption for three years.

The resolution was read by the Town Clerk John E. Cameron at an open meeting with Mayor Henry W. Wedge presiding which followed a three-hour caucus meeting by the Council. The motion was moved by Councillor W. E. Jenkins and seconded by Councillor Clarence Stevie. Councillor Andrew Perry abstained from voting because of his interests in the Association.

Made Unanimous

Councillors Donald Lidstone, Dr. Hillard Clark and James MacDougall made the motion unanimous in supporting the resolution.

After the meeting opened Mayor Wedge said it had been called to consider a request by the Summerside Trotting Association for assistance to build a rink and agricultural building and one that could serve for purposes allied with physical fitness. He stated that the matter had been under discussion at several meetings and he thanked the Council for their attention to the subject.

He referred to his own interest in the matter of a rink for Summerside and he congratulated the members of the Summerside Trotting Association for their enterprise and initiative and hoped the project would be concluded to the satisfaction of the citizens and the Association.

Text Of Resolution

"Whereas a committee from the Summerside Trotting Association Ltd. having made by representation to the Town Council of the Town of Summerside a request for financial assistance in the erection of a building on land owned by the Summerside Trotting Association Limited, said building to be used for agricultural exhibitions, skating rink with artificial ice and a general physical fitness center.

"And whereas the Town Council of the Town of Summerside realizing the vital need of such a center in this community and whereas this council not wanting to undertake the construction of such a building or become owners or operators of such a center and whereas the Provincial Government has signified its willingness to give financial assistance to this project through the municipality of the Town of Summerside and whereas the said Association has already shown its interest in promoting activities of a sporting nature by constructing the present Raceway and its further interest in endeavoring to develop a Prince County exhibition and sports center.

"Be it therefore resolved that this council go on record as being prepared to enter into a suitable arrangement with the Summerside Trotting Association, its directors, or subsidiaries thereof, whereby the Town of Summerside will provide financial assistance up to an amount not exceeding \$50,000 (fifty thousand dollars) providing plans and specifications for building and

"\$15,000 to be paid, over to the Summerside Trotting Association Ltd., its directors or subsidiaries thereof, to be used towards the installation of an artificial ice plant in said building during installation of said ice plant.

"And whereas the Summerside Trotting Association Ltd., has shown its goodwill by offering to the said Town of Summerside shares of stock in the said Summerside Trotting Association Ltd., or subsidiary thereof.

"Be it further resolved that said shares of stock to the extent of \$50,000 be accepted by the Town of Summerside.

"An whereas the Provincial Government has made known that it will grant loans to municipalities for the purpose of constructing community or youth welfare centres, interest free, for a period of ten years, payable in ten equal annual payments.

"Be it therefore resolved that the Town of Summerside borrow from the Provincial Government the amount of sixty five thousand four hundred and seventy dollars (\$65,470.00) for a period of ten years to be paid in ten equal annual payments for the purpose of assisting the Summerside Trotting Association Limited, its directors or subsidiaries thereof towards the construction of a community youth centre including a skating rink with artificial ice and such building to be used also as an agricultural exhibition building.

"And further resolved that in consideration of the Town of Summerside making this loan to the Summerside Trotting Association Ltd., its directors or subsidiaries, a first mortgage for the amount of \$65,470 be requested from the Summerside Trotting Association Ltd., its directors or subsidiaries by the Town of Summerside as security for the loan.

Repayment Conditions

"And further resolved that repayment of said loan be requested as follows: \$6547.00 annually for ten years.

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"\$35,000 to be paid in whole or in part to the Summerside Trotting Association, its directors or subsidiaries thereof to be used towards the construction of such building when construction of such building is nearing completion and progress reports submitted by the president of said Association show the total cost of said building to date is at least \$90,000 and accounts for this amount have been paid.

"Be it further resolved that the payment of the said \$50,000 will be as follows:

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Estimate Cost Of Building In Vicinity \$200,000

—When asked for comment last evening on the resolution passed yesterday afternoon by the Summerside Town Council which would make \$115,470 available to the Summerside Trotting Association towards the construction of an arena in Summerside to be used for skating, a youth centre, agricultural building etc. Mr. S. H. Hewitt, vice president of the Association, said the Association could not make a definite statement on whether or not they could accept the town's offer until they had more fully completed a survey into construction cost of the proposed building, which reports indicate will cost in the vicinity of \$200,000.

Several of the officers and directors of the Association leave today to look over rinks in Halifax and other mainland centres. If arrangements can be completed it is expected that work on the proposed building will begin as soon as plans and specifications can be drawn up. It is believed that the building will be of steel frame construction and will be modern in every respect.

It will be constructed facing Notre Dame Street on property owned by the Summerside Trotting Association and presently used as part of the existing parking lot on the Summerside Raceway.

Raceway officials expressed doubt that the artificial ice plant can be installed in time for use this winter as orders for this equipment and the steel for frame construction will require a few weeks for preparation and delivery.

However, they pointed out that nothing definite can be announced until the whole project has been fully investigated, studied, and all the various information compiled.

A social half hour followed when tea was served.
