TRAVEL by steamer is quite brisk, says the Pioneer. One day the first of last week 80 passengers went over, and 40 returned in the evening. Yet the Montreal Journal of Commerce thinks we export "at most a few potatoes, oats and cattle, and now and then an old passenger."

On Tuesday afternoon last Mr. Hugh McLesse of Brae, while out at Brae Island found on the shore a dead body. The head was entirely gone from the trunk and one arm from the elbow was also gone. The body was in a highly decayed state. There was an overcoat on the body and in the pockets were found a pipe and a pencil. Evidently death had taken place a good while previous. It was thought by some that it had been in the water all winter and that possibly the ice had something to do with the loss of the head. It is the prevailing opinion that the body is that of Charles Rice, lost overboard when the Restive was coming from Bay Chaleur last October and while she was off Lot 7 shore.—Pioneer.

K. D. C. For Everybody

Opposing Phillips Brooks.

SOURIS, I. A. May 6.—The High Church party are disposed to oppose the election to a bishopric of their liberal-minded and truly Christian brother, Dr. Phillips Brooks. Bishop Perry of Iowa, referring to it, says: "There is likely to be opposition to his confirmation at the convention of bishops. At different times he has been elected to the office which he has been elevated. He has even gone so far as to express disbelief in the historic episcopacies. That is a point on which the bishops are agreed in entertaining strong convictions, and as a matter of conscience they could not vote to admit to their number a man who differed from them. In rejecting him the bishops will have acted in the only way possible for them to act, believing as they do."

BOSTON, May 6.—Phillips Brooks, when seen late to-night was very much surprised at Bishop Perry's reported statement. He had retired for the night but his Christian spirit did not desert him, and he was gentle and kindly as always. "I have had no intimation of such things," he said, "and therefore do not care to discuss the matter. The question of my confirmation must go to the standing committees before it goes to the bishops for final action; my election here was only a nomination, practically." In regard to his position in the matter of church tenets and dogmas he declined to say a word.

PARNELL NOT YET FREE. LONDON, May 4.—Though no official confirmation can be obtained, the story that the Queen's Proctor is making inquiries with a view to intervene in the O'Shea vs. Parnell divorce suit, to prevent the decree being made absolute, it is generally credited.

It is stated that the information supplied to the Queen's Proctor alleges that O'Shea suppresses material facts. If this is proved to have been the case, the divorce proceedings will be annulled, and Parnell cannot marry Mrs. O'Shea. A belief is prevalent throughout that the least independent inquiry would upset O'Shea's case, not by disproving the adultery of his wife, but by showing a negligence and indifference on his part which might amount to collusion.

It is understood that the Queen's Proctor has been forced to take cognizance of the case by the action of Parnell's political opponents. They know that Parnell intended to marry Mrs. O'Shea, which marriage would rehabilitate him in England and preclude further allusions to the divorce suit. Therefore, if the queen's divorce is enabled to upset the decree, it would damage Parnell, by preventing him from making the only reparation in his power. The solicitor-general, Sir Edward Clarke, Q. C., who is the queen's proctor's official superior, was O'Shea's counsel, and can very likely stop the proceedings in O'Shea's interest.

SUN SPOTS AND HEART FAILURE. New spots were visible yesterday in the sun's northern hemisphere. Another disturbance marked by two large spots is now seen, in the sun's southern hemisphere. The two disturbances have progressed nearly together across the sun's disk, and both have been very active. The magnetic disturbance has been marked, and the sensitives have suffered seriously. Those inclined to irregular action of the heart have been great sufferers, and several sudden deaths have occurred. Among them may be named Count von Moltke and Judge Nelson, of Poughkeepsie.

Last week was singular for the number of such deaths. The sun is a near neighbor, only about 100 of its own diameters away from us, and we feel the effects of its changing energy instantly.—Rochester Democrat.

REMARKABLE RELIGIOUS REVIVAL. CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 7.—One of the most remarkable religious revivals in the history of Cleveland has been in progress here for the past three weeks under the direction of the Rev. Mr. Mills, the evangelist, and supported by a union of the principal evangelical churches of the city. Wednesday was observed as a "mid-week Sabbath," and fully one-half of the large business houses and many manufacturing concerns closed in the afternoon in order to allow their employees to attend the services. Music Hall has been crowded evening after evening with thousands of people. Upwards of 7,000 persons have already signed cards signifying their intention to become Christians. The meeting will close next Sunday.

CLOSED SEALING SEASON PROBABLE. NEW YORK, May 7.—A Washington special to the Tribune says: There is a growing impression here that the result of the negotiations now being conducted by Mr. Blaine and Sir Julian Pauncefote will be a closed sealing season this year in Behring Sea. No definite agreement until after to be reached or announced until after the return of President Harrison to Washington on May 14 or 15, but the drift of opinion has set strongly in the direction of a convention between this Government and Great Britain which will suspend the taking of seals for the current year.

HON. JOHN LEFURGEY'S DEATH. The body of the late Hon. John Lefurgey of Summerside, arrived in Moncton on the express from St. John this morning and was taken through to Point du Chene. The body was accompanied by Mrs. Lefurgey, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. McSweeney and Mr. Brennan. Mr. McSweeney said that Mrs. Lefurgey and Mrs. McSweeney arrived in Boston three hours after Mr. Lefurgey's death, which was caused by Pneumonia. At the time of Mr. Lefurgey's death, none of his friends were with him excepting of his New York agent. Mr. McSweeney will remain in Summerside until the end of the week.—Moncton Transcript.

ANOTHER GREAT VICTORY. LONDON, May 9.—The elections in South Leicestershire Friday was a great victory for Gladstonians. Logan, Liberal, had 6982 votes, Hardy, Conservative, 5493. In the last election the Conservatives had 1123 of a majority.

BIG STAKES. LONDON, May 9.—The great race for the Kempton Park Jubilee stakes—three thousand sovereigns—was won by Menthorpe, with Matagm second and Rusticus third.

RAVAGES OF THE GRIP. LONDON, May 9.—Influenza is still spreading. Twenty six members of the Commons are ill. Lord Knutsford has been unable to attend a committee. The business in the departments is greatly hampered by illness of the clerks.

COULD'NT STAND THE GRIP. ST. JOHN, May 9.—Chas. Roach a young man suffering from la grippe attempted to suicide this morning at the Brunswick hotel by cutting his throat with a razor. He is not severely injured.

CLAIM ON ST. MARTIN'S SEMINARY. ST. JOHN, May 8.—The Union Baptist Education Society to find a trustee deed for the benefit of the creditors. The property is the Baptist Seminary at St. Martin's and J. S. Titus of St. Martin's is trustee. The society has a debt of \$30,000 on the building and this action was forced by a creditor pressing his claim. The society in order to preserve the valuable seminary property at St. Martin's for the benefit of all creditors, deemed an assignment the best course to pursue. There are still \$8,000 unpaid subscriptions which the directors relied on to help them. An effort was made to raise to the sum of \$15,000 in subscriptions of \$200 each, payable on the condition that the whole amount was raised, but only half the amount was forthcoming. The cost of the seminary building and furnishing was \$65,000. The seminary will be continued for the present in the hope that some arrangement may be made to run along.
