300 Civil Servants Dismissed As Indonesian Purge Goes On

JAKARTA (Reuters)—Sixty-five Indonesian officials have been arrested and more than 300 dismissed in a continuing purge of civil servants believed involved in last October's abortive coup, Antara news agency said here.

All the officials being held and 263 of those dismissed were employed in the finance department.

Antara reported that in West Java the education department has withdrawn teaching permits from 44 Chinese schools and their staff. The government claims China was implicated in the coup.

In Jogjakarta, west of here, 1,000 high school students seized three large Chinese buildings and transferred the keys to the local military authorities.

Foreign Minister Adam Malik Thursday announced that a military commander dismissed earlier this year, former navy chief of staff, rear admiral R. E. Martadinata, would soon be appointed envoy to a European country.

Antara also said the economic affairs department has wound up the activities of Indonesia's rubber a f f a i r s organization which formerly handled the country's exports.

Meanwhile, the government protested to the United States against its decision to sell rubber from the U.S. stockpile. A protest note said the U.S. should consult producers—of which Indonesia is the world's second biggest—before doing so.

Radio Jakarta, monitored in Singapore, meanwhile reported that members of the Indonesian Students Action Front demonstrated peacefully in the capital Thursday against composition of the new supreme advisory council.

The students said the new council, recently reorganized by President Sukarno, did not reflect the people's wishes.

Mine Company's Earnings Decline

MONTREAL (CP) — Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. of Canada Ltd. has reported estimated net earnings of \$12,200,000 or 73 cents a share for the first quarter of 1966, ended March 31.

This compares with actual earnings of \$13,400,000 or 80 cents a share for the corresponding period last year.

William S. Kirkpatrick, president, told the company's annual meeting here that the decrease in earnings this year resulted in part from a shortage of box-cars and from other transportation problems which delayed deliveries.

ACCEPTS RESIGNATION WASHINGTON (AP)

The White House announced Thursday that President Johnson has accepted with "regret" the resignation of Thomas C. Mann as undersecretary of state for economic affairs. Mann's resignation, after 24 years of service with the federal government, will become effective June 1. No successor has been selected. Mann, a specialist in Latin American affairs, intends to enter private business.
