The cancer campaign throughout the province generally is proceeding well with very few places not organized and canvassing.

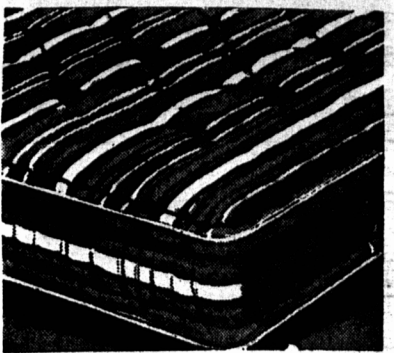

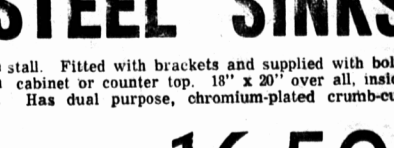
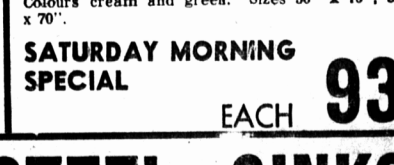

## French Seek To Work Out Departure Of Sultan

RABAT, Morocco (Reuters)—French officials Thursday were working out how the departure from Rabat of Sultan Moulay ben Arafah could be both public enough to be "dignified" and secret enough to prevent possible demonstrations by French settlers.

The aged sultan was expected to be removed from the throne and replaced by a three-member council "immediately" as the French government pressed long-delayed implementation of its Moroccan "new deal."

French settlers were reported divided on how best to oppose the government's policy of removing the sultan, first step in a plan to set up a representative Moroccan government.

Jacques Le Coroller, chairman of the French Presence Movement, largest settlers' body in Morocco, saw the resident-general, Gen. Pierre Boyer de Latour Thursday. He said later the movement remained unalterably opposed to the plan to remove Ben Arafah but would not use violence. His organization opposes impending moves towards Moroccan self-rule.

But Col. Jean Abel Leboeuf, another settlers' spokesman, indicated other settlers would not stand passively. He said "if Ben Arafah leaves the palace it can only be as a corpse."

In Casablanca four persons were killed and four injured by terrorists in nine separate incidents Wednesday.

## Group Of Indonesians To Study At Antigonish

ANTIGONISH, N.S. (CP)—The first group of Indonesians visiting Canada under the Colombo plan to study co-operatives and fisheries have begun a three-month course of study with the extension department of Saint Francis Xavier University here.

Leaders of the six-man delegation is Mardjono W. Miharjida, a member of the head office of education and information, division of co-operatives in Indonesia.

One of the big jobs in Indonesia, the fluent English-speaking leader said, is to protect the farmers against private money lenders charging as much as 80 per cent a month interest on loans. At credit unions, he said, interest rates are one per cent and less.

The Indonesian government and the republic's 10,000 co-operatives also were trying to combat illiteracy. About 75 per cent of the 90,000,000 people are unable to read.

The main talks will have to tackle the problems of the union's economic demands. The UAW has asked for a 15-cent hourly wage increase, eight paid holidays a year instead of the present six and company-paid medical and hospital insurance.

The company offered a modified version of the guaranteed annual wage, included in a package offer which the union said was worth 17.7 cents an hour.

## Five Fined For Smuggling

ARTHABASKA, Que. (CP)—Four men and one woman have been fined for their part in what the RCMP described as a smoothly operating ring that smuggled more than \$100,000 worth of nylon stockings into Canada from the United States. Two other men have been ordered to stand trial in the Court of Queen's Bench.

All were charged with conspiracy to deal in smuggled goods and nylons, and six of them appeared in court Wednesday in this Eastern Township's town about 100 miles northeast of Montreal.

Clovis Hamel of Sherbrooke, Que., was sentenced to a fine of \$1,000 or three months in jail. Lucien Houle and Fernand Toulouse, both of Woburn, Que., were sentenced to fines of \$200 each or three months in jail. A similar sentence was given Yvonne Audet of Lac Megantic, Que.
