The Annual meeting of The Ladies Aid of the Community Hospital O'Leary was held in the board room on Wednesday evening Jan. 21st, 1959. With thirty-seven members present representing thirteen districts.

The retiring president Mrs. Donald MacKenzie called the meeting to order by repeating The Lord's Prayer in unison. Mrs. MacKenzie thanked all the officers, convenors, and all individual aid members who helped to make the past year the success it was financially and solicited the good will and untiring efforts of all to work with the new president.

The hospital matron, Mrs. A. MacLeod installed the new slate of officers: President, Mrs. L. G. Dewar; past president, Mrs. Donald MacKenzie; vice-president, Mrs. Robert Woodside, recording secretary, Mrs. Leslie Gorrell; corresponding secretary, Mrs. George MacIsaac.

Treasurer, Mrs. Douglas Adams assistant treasurer, Mrs. Thirn Ellis; supply secretary, Mrs. John Coughlin, assistant supply secretary, Mrs. Charles Dewar; ways-and-means, Mrs. Alton Raynor; assistant ways and means, Mrs. Felix Arsenault; directors: Mrs. Harry Adams, Mrs. Neil MacKay, Mrs. Willard Bets, and Mrs. John Platts.

Mrs. Dewar then occupied the chair and asked for the continued interest and support of the aid members this year especially in view of the fact that we have new Laundry Equipment to pay for. Reports showed that twelve meetings were held during the year with an average attendance of twenty-five members. There were also, four executive meetings held. The total paid up membership was one hundred and forty-six as compared with eighty-seven in 1957. Conveners reports showed that Auxiliary Aids and Women's Institutes rendered invaluable help.

The Treasurer reported a total of \$2,855.87 raised during the year by the following main ways: variety concert, pantry sale's by districts, birthday box, minstrel show by The Lion's Club, Summerside picnic and bazaar, bazaar at West Point Boat race, fall fair, catering to the West Prince Plovering Match, hospital cart, collections, recalls, tag day by Howland Aid, Money from Women's Institute convention at West Devon, and money raised by autograph quilt made by Mrs. Neil Boulter.

Grateful thanks are due: Legion for free use of Hall for picnic and fall fair, Mrs. Neil Boulter for her quilt, all who donated articles for bazaars and fall fair, Rev. Mr. Keenan for all printing done for the Aid. To hospital matron Mrs. A. A. MacLeod for her excellent support and direction to the aid. To all officers, conveners, members and any who participated in anyway toward a successful year.

A total of \$2,191.65 was spent on the hospital. The main purchases for the year included: Trolley for oxygen tank, cystoscope, instruments to the value of \$231.47, sterilizer, intervenor stand, kick bucket, wagenstein suction, institutional vacuum cleaner, painting to the amount of \$309.23, 4 dozen dish towels and dischlothes, filing cabinets, A deposit on full laundry equipment ordered in December. Articles were also bought for the children's ward.
