MARY HAWORTH
Wife Advises Rebellion Against Litany Of Woes

Dear Mary Haworth: After 10 years of attentive listening to your husband's litany of woes, at breakfast, dinner and all evening long, I went on strike. I did so because I realized I was turning into a sullen, bored, disaffected woman.

Fuming may be fun for the fumer but it can be poison to his intimates. In any case, it is destructive even to those who initiate it. So, if you are tired of trying to "listen creatively" to a dowbeat man, my advice is, rebel!

Take a positive stand with a three-point program, to wit:
1. If his daily complaints are susceptible of real solutions (for example: how to find a new secretary as good as the old?) then make suggestions, frankly and firmly. If necessary, find the solution for him.

2. If he is merely rehearsing the routine difficulties of dealing with clients, employees, and in general, tell him so and refuse to listen. And I do mean

refuse, no matter how rude it seems. Turn on the TV, pick up a book, leave the house or lock yourself in the bathroom. Remember this: it is poison you are refusing to take. It can be seriously harmful if you swallow enough of it.

3. Counter attack vigorously. Find your own interests. Embrace them and talk about them. Insist that your husband join in. Any pleasant activity is better for him than a wallowing in gloom. If he dislikes your interests, he may even develop a few of his own.

Naturally, my husband fought my resistance program; but we discovered to our surprise that we enjoyed our pitched battles more than the old gloomy monologues. Now, 18 months later, we seldom argue, except over whether a given topic is a real worry or fret for a week.

Meanwhile my husband does much more reading, has taken up a hobby (making model planes) and goes out more. But most

important, he tells me often now, "I always had so much interest in and attractive I am than I used to be. Pass the good word along to other wives who may profit by it.—A.D."

Dear A.D.: Thanks for a refreshing contribution. Your hard-won decision to be true to yourself, and the good fruits thereof, are a real tonic. Dr. Erich Fromm's theory (as told in his book "The Art of Loving") that a relationship thrives only when two persons communicate with one another from the center of their being.

This eminent analyst tells us that real conflicts—those that don't cover up or distort, but express real feelings and convictions—are not destructive. Rather, they clarify. They lead to aliveness and strength in the exchange.

Discussing the disintegration of love in Western society, Dr. Fromm says that much of the debilitating discord in our man-woman relationships is a result of trying to avoid honest facing up to explosive issues. With painstaking care he emphasizes the fact that true love is possible only for those who have the courage, candor, self-esteem and self-acceptance to behave with integrity.—M.H.
