**TIGNISH** — E.C. Gaudette was re-elected chairman of the English Village Commission at the March meeting held in the fire hall Tuesday evening.

A letter of appreciation will be sent to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police detachment at the commission, for the co-operation and assistance given to Police Constable Howard Foley in conjunction with police duties carried out in the village and surrounding areas.
