A VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—An exchange says that a man named William McLusky while cleaning out a water-course that crosses his farm, a mile from Upper Woodstock, found some specimens of gold-bearing quartz, very rich in the precious metal. A vein of quartz traverses several farms in the neighborhood.

AGAINST INCORPORATION.—Yarmouth, N. S., has voted against incorporation. The vote stood 204 for and 225 against. The amendment of last session was found to cut off a large number of the younger men who were not assessed for \$500 personal property, and this had a good deal to do with the small vote. A VALUABLE ANIMAL.—It is reported that A. C. Bell, of New Glasgow, has purchased in Kentucky a three-year-old stallion, a grandson of the great Belmont on his sire's side, and his dam is a daughter of Harold, sire of Maud S. This is a highly-bred youngster, and will be a valuable acquisition to the trotting stock of the Maritime Provinces.

BOARD OF TRADE.—The Board of Trade room in Cameron Block, opposite the Post Office, was opened to-day, under the auspices of the new secretary, Mr. B. D. Higgins. The room will henceforth be open every day and leading commercial papers will be on file for the benefit of members. SUCCESSFUL ISLAND STUDENTS.—In the report of the results of the Law School examinations in Dalhousie College, we notice that Humphrey Melish stands in the first class in Law, Bills Notes, Equity and Partnership. George Schurman another Island Student takes a first class in constitutional law, Contracts, and Criminal Law, leading the whole class in the two subjects first named. Mr. Melish is a brother of J. T. Melish, Esq., of this city, and Mr. Schurman is a brother of Prof. Schurman, of Cornell University.

BURGLARS AGAIN.—Between one and two o'clock yesterday morning some persons entered the residence of James Rush, at the West End, and stole therefrom an overcoat and some cash. An entrance was effected through a window. Yesterday afternoon two young men broke the fastening of the rear door of Mr. W. J. Fraser's workshop, Grafton Street, and were inside the building likely in search of something to carry off, when they were frightened away.

SUDDEN DEATH.—On Saturday evening last a man named Henderson slipped and fell on the sidewalk on Richmond Street, near Robertson's barber shop. When he got up he found that his leg was very painful near the hip joint, and he thought it was broken. He was removed to his home as soon as possible. After his arrival there the pain in his leg became more intense. Dr. Warburton was called in between eight and nine o'clock the same evening. The doctor did not find anything seriously the matter with the leg, and left the house. Later on Henderson died. He was, we are informed, in very delicate health for some time before the accident.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—A very pleasant meeting of Fairplay Division, No. 163, West River, was held on Saturday evening. Mr. W. S. McKie, of Orient Division, and Mr. J. J. Chappelle, of Victoria Division, were present for the City. One new candidate was initiated. The ceremony of initiation was performed in a way that reflected credit on the W. P. and the Division. "Under good of the order" some very fine temperance recitations were rendered. The visitors, in the course of their remarks, made reference to the loss sustained by the cause of temperance during the year, in the death of Donald Lamont, Esq. The members were enjoined to continue in the good work of the Order, to move steadily forward, until the grand ultimatum, Prohibition, will have become an accomplished fact.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Mysterious Death.

St. JOHN, N. B., March 16. City Marshal Sharp died suddenly on Saturday under circumstances which Coroner Berryman considers requires an investigation. The story goes that while passing a house kept by one Mary Ann O'Brien, Sharp was taken suddenly weak, and he went in and asked for a glass of water. After the woman gave him the water she sent for a coach to take him home, but when the coach arrived he was unfit to be removed. Dr. Berryman arrived shortly afterwards, but could do nothing. After the doctor's arrival Sharp's appearance, it is said, indicated slight symptoms of poisoning, but the doctor will not say anything pending an enquiry to be held on Tuesday.

Quebec Parliament.

QUEBEC, March 16. In the House on Friday there was another debate on the \$10,000 grant to Toronto University, objection being taken to the vote on the ground that the University did not need money, and that it ought instead to be devoted to the purposes of elementary education. The resolutions, however, were concurred in by a vote of 28 to 19.

It is now considered probable that the local legislature will not discuss the bill for the abolition of the Chinese tax exemption this session.

Labor Conference.

BERLIN, March 16. The Berlin International Conference formally opened Saturday in Prince Bismarck's palace. The opening ceremony was more in the nature of a social than an official gathering. Many preliminary matters were disposed of. Baron Von Berlepsch, Prussian Minister of Commerce, welcomed the delegates to the German capital in the name of the Emperor, and was elected President of the Conference, with Herr Magdenburg, Under Secretary of Commerce, as Vice President. The deliberations will be carried on behind closed doors. Strict secrecy has been enjoined upon the delegates touching the debates and all other proceedings.

Against the Declaration.

VIENNA, March 16. The newspapers and statesmen indignantly protest against the recent declaration of the bishops that the Catholic Church have unlimited sway over the whole system of public education. The official organs point out that it means the submission of the State to the Church, which they declare to be impossible.

The Dock Laborers' Strike.

LIVERPOOL, March 16. The dock laborers on strike here have assumed such a menacing attitude that orders have been issued for troops to be held in readiness to suppress any demonstration that may occur. The government have ordered the closing of all inns. Twelve thousand Nottinghamshire miners have joined the strikers for an advance of wages.

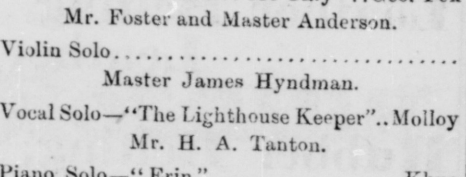

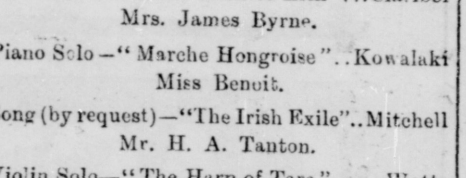
