OUR DAIRY OUTPUT.

In the hope that we should be able to lay before our readers a full statement of the output of our cheese and butter factories in the past year, we addressed a letter to the Secretary of each factory early in November last. Some of these responded promptly; others in due time. To all who have done so, our thanks are due. A few of these latter very kindly sent, besides the statistics requested, interesting accounts of their experience, progress and success in the business. The reports of several of these gentlemen will be found in another column of this day's issue of THE EXAMINER; and others may be inserted later. But nearly half of those to whom we addressed our letters have not made any reply, so that we have been unable to issue the statement desired. The efforts of the President of the Board of Trade have, however, been better rewarded, though even he has, so far, failed to obtain a complete statement to lay before the public. From the returns made to him and from figures supplied by Mr. Dillon, it is, however, estimated that at least 46,000 boxes of cheese were manufactured in this Province last year. These at an average of 68 pounds per box amounted to 3,128,000 pounds, sold at an average price of eight cents per pound, brought into the Province \$250,240.00.

This butter product at 18 cents per pound gave \$110,931.13. So that the output of our dairies, in the past year, was worth, at a low estimate, \$361,000. It would take 1,200,000 bushels of oats, or close upon 2,000,000 of potatoes, at the usual prices per bushel, to bring in as much money; and we should besides, be minus a considerable amount of the fertility of our farms. The dairy industry is, it will be seen, well worth prosecuting prudently and continuously. The attention of cheese-makers is directed to the report of the remarks recently made by Professor Robertson and Mr. Dillon at Kingston, Ontario. The British market now demands cheese of a milder flavour than that which has hitherto been manufactured in Canada; and to this end the cheese must be manufactured and cured in a lower temperature.

BOLD POLITICAL JOB.

ADVICES from British Columbia state that the Legislature of British Columbia, under the leadership of Messrs. Semlin and Martin, has passed a bill to declare Messrs. Prentice and Dean, government supporters, entitled to sit in the Legislature for this session and prohibiting the Supreme Court from proceeding with the petitions against them until after the close of the session.

In the case of Mr. Prentice, the point was that he was not a qualified candidate not being on the voters' list. To prove this the collector of votes had been subpoenaed to attend. This official did not obey the summons, because the Attorney-General did not give him the permission asked for to leave his office, and the court, therefore, issued a new order directing him to be present on the following day when it was expected Mr. Prentice would be declared disqualified and the seat awarded to Mr. Stoddart, the late member. The case of Mr. Deane was postponed on motion of his own counsel until the 16th inst. In the meantime, he appeared at the bar of the Legislature, was sworn in, and actually voted in the House on the bill declaring himself elected for the session. The bill to seat these two Government supporters was forced through the House in advance of the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, as otherwise the court would have dealt with the trials before the bill could have been passed.

These are the bad facts of this outrageous case, for which few parallels can be found. It is pleasing to note that it will not be permitted to pass unchallenged. All fair-minded and honest men are indignant at the audacious interference with a court of justice of which the Government leaders in British Columbia are guilty. A mass meeting was held in Victoria on the evening of the day on which the bill was passed. The meeting was crowded to the doors, and resolutions were passed condemning the bills as an interference with the constitution of popular government, and appealing to the Speaker, the Lieutenant-Governor and the Governor-General to exercise their power on behalf of right. A deputation proceeded to the Legislative Chamber. But the Speaker refused to lay their petition before the House. The usurpers of authority in British Columbia have apparently determined to rule in despite of the people and the law.

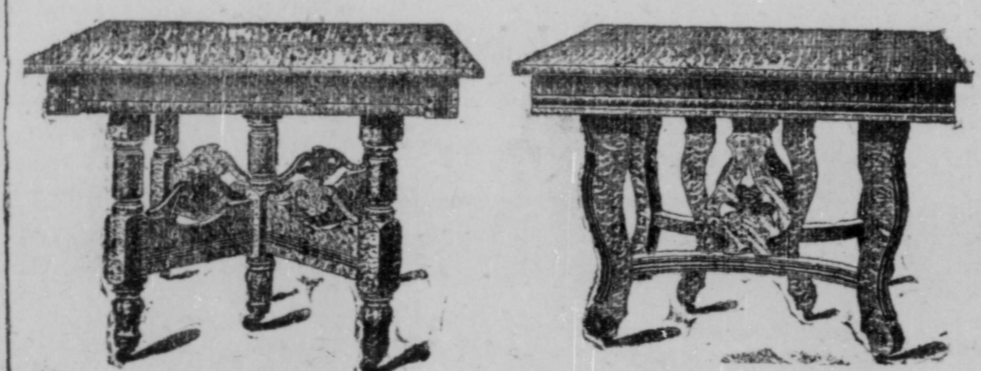
