Whether the holder of an outstanding "freak" should start with a one-bid and go slowly upward, or start with a shutout bid of some degree, or, finally, should even pass at his first opportunity and "await developments"—well, any group of experts would split up into three distinct factions on this point! It is not possible to prove the superiority of one method over another—the conditions which exist, involving the reactions of the other three players, must be weighed each time on their merits.

However, while conceding all this, it is nevertheless valid to point out that the sort of bidding philosophy West held in the following deal does not "figure to pan out" against competent opponents.

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

South, a good card-player, made his doubled contract easily enough, getting East into a coup which

held him to one trump trick. The club ace was the only other loser.

Obviously, West felt that his nine-card diamond suit, fortified with 100 honors, gave him such liberty of action that he could well afford to wait and see what course the bidding took. Also, he probably felt that when he finally came in, presumably at a very high level, the opponents would be shocked into doubling, on the supposition that West was making a desperate "save." Against competent opponents, however, this is a very dubious tactic! Observe that North was not "shocked" in the slightest degree—he simply went on his way.

Which leads us back to the burning question of West's first call. With due consideration of all possible developments, a five-diamond shutout had more to commend it than any other action.
