

Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary Anglican Churches Meets

The semi annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of England in Canada was held in the Parish of Milton on June 27th with a large number of delegates present.

After the joint Holy Communion service of the W.A. and the Diocesan Church Society when the celebrant was the Ven. Archdeacon Harrison assisted by the clergy of the deanery, the preacher being the Rev. Dr. Ferguson of St. Paul's Parish Church, a delightful luncheon was served by the ladies of the Milton W.A.

The meeting was convened at 2 p.m. which the President, Mrs. A.B. Cosh opened with prayer. After brief interim reports by the officers of the different departments, the ladies of the Nova Scotia Anglican Mission Van, Mrs. Mason and Miss Manning, spoke in detail of their work. They had spent the past month in Prince Edward Island in the parishes of Georgetown, Cherry Valley, Crapaud and in Borden. They stressed the necessity of work among youth in P.E.I. and also gave an interesting account of winter work in a mission in Athabasca.

Since the annual meeting in March the W.A. has lost through death a Life Member, Mrs. W.S. Bait of St. Peter's Cathedral, a former board member and devoted worker.

Regret was expressed at the absence of the Hon. President, Mrs. Raymond at present in Toronto and the absence through illness of Mrs. C.H. Coles, 1st. Vice President. Greetings were sent to them and others unable to be present. Thanks were expressed to Mrs. W.R. Jenkins who acted as Recording Secretary in the absence of Mr. E.V. Bell, who sent greetings to the meeting.

Mrs. Ray Clark and Mrs. Hogg of St. Mary's W.A., Summerside, were admitted to Life Membership on the Diocesan Board, the service being taken by the President as-

sisted by the Candidates Secretary, Mrs. Ernest Champion and the Treasurer, Miss Harris. An enthusiastic welcome was accorded Miss Cotton, Cor. Sec'y, on her reappearance at the meetings after her serious illness.

Discussion followed on the G.A. Camp for which successful preparations had been made and for which a large number of girls had applied.

The Camp Commandant, Miss Joan Frome, a university graduate, arrived in Charlottetown on Friday 29th and was the guest of Mrs. Maurice Weeks until July 2nd, when the G.A. went into camp at Camp Kingston.

An urgent appeal was made for funds for the Youth Committee whose object is to promote Anglican youth work in P.E.I. and to send girls to training courses which are held from time to time in connection with Toronto University. This fund also provides for extra G.A. camp expenses and equipment as the fee for girls at camp has been kept to the same low level in spite of rising costs of food and maintenance. The Diocesan W.A. is to be congratulated on this camp which keeps on a level with other Diocesan G.A. camps and gives our girls the chance of becoming useful G.A. and W.A. members and possible missionaries or mission helpers.

In closing the President expressed the pleasure and satisfaction that the semi annual gives to the W.A. providing an opportunity for members to meet representatives from branches over the Island. Thanks were due to the Milton W.A. for hospitality and the delicious luncheon and afternoon tea service.

Greetings were sent to Bishop Waterman and thanks expressed to Archdeacon Harrison and the clergy of the Deanery for their assistance in making the semi annual such an outstanding success. The meeting closed with the benediction.

Britain Seizes Tankers Built For Red Poland

LONDON, July 17 (AP) — Britain, prodded by the United States, invoked war-time powers Saturday and seized two new oil tankers built here for Communist Poland.

The action is the first of its kind since the end of Second World War. It came after the U.S. strongly protested against letting the 7,600-gross-ton vessels be delivered to the Soviet satellite.

The foreign office announced that the admiralty requisitioned the tankers under defence regulations. These are the government's war-time powers still in effect.

Conservatives had charged that British factories were turning out machine tools — vitally needed for defence work — for export to Russia and Poland.

The blocking of delivery of the oil tankers to Poland posed a more difficult problem for the British government. Ordered more than two years ago by the Polish Ocean Lines, title to the ships already had passed to the Polish line last December after about 90 per cent of the purchase price was paid.

The U.S. first asked Britain to prevent delivery of the tankers last May. There have been frequent Anglo-American exchanges on them since then.

The tankers are the Tetry and the Beskid. Polish ambassador Jerzy Michalowski was summoned to the foreign office Saturday and told of Britain's action in seizing them.

Britain indicated she would give Poland her money back.

Man Shot On Beer Expedition

NEW ELM, N.S., July 17 (CP) — Alphonse Bizeau, 44, was shot to death near a batch of home-made beer in the woods by his home Saturday and the R.C.M.P. placed a guard at the hospital bedside of Mrs. Grace Smith, 32, who turned the rifle on herself.

The woman, who had accompanied Bizeau into the bush fringing this Lunenburg County village on what police said was a beer-bottling expedition, suffered a smashed shoulder. Victoria General Hospital authorities in Halifax said she was in no danger.

The mounted police said an argument broke out shortly after Bizeau and Mrs. Smith reached the clearing. During an ensuing scuffle, the .32-calibre rifle which Bizeau was said to have always carried on such trips, went off. He was killed instantly.

Bees Attack Horse And Man

OWEN SOUND, Ont., July 17 (CP) — A runaway horse was stung to death Friday and its owner gravely poisoned by hundreds of bees at Kilsyth, five miles southwest of Owen Sound.

Howard Thompson, 39, of Kilsyth was still in serious condition today. His wife said, "he was so bad he didn't recognize me. He collapsed three times."

Thompson and his son Norman, 10, were skidding logs in the bush Friday. Suddenly, for no apparent reason, the horses bolted, splitting their harness. One galloped into Hogart's nearby bee yard.

Thompson rushed after his horse, tried to pacify it and lead it to safety. He was too late. Swirling, angry bees stung the horse to death and Thompson was stung many times on his neck, head and shoulders.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 15 (AP) — Governor Earl Warren Saturday ordered film actress Madge Meredith freed from prison. Warren commuted her five year life sentence to time served.

The former starlet was convicted in 1947 of complicity in the kidnapping and beating of her one-time business manager, Nick Giannacis, and his bodyguard, Vera Davis. She has been in prison since May 9, 1949.

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A Country Garden

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and beautiful perennials for the country garden.

They are easily grown from seed and every year some seed is sown in this garden as I never have as many of these lovely perennials as I wish.

The new varieties are so superior to the old and good seed must be grown. July is a fine month to sow the seed, especially when there is moisture in the soil.

The vegetable garden is a good place to start these perennials and transplanting plants next year.

If you like flowers that grow on a spike you will receive a great deal of pleasure from growing delphiniums. Few people can resist the appeal of the modern delphinium with its colorful spikes.

The name delphinium was given by the Greeks who by some stretch of the imagination saw a resemblance of the delphinium bud to a large ocean fish called dolphin. In England delphiniums are referred to as Larkspurs because that part of the flower that secretes the nectar was thought to resemble the spur of a lark's claw.

In this country modern double delphiniums are referred to as "hollyhock" delphiniums because of a supposed resemblance to that flower.

The modern delphinium is the result of hybridization of a number of species that are found in different parts of the world. One is found in the Swiss Alps, another in Siberia, a third in India and a fourth in Armenia.

When we think of the history of this perennial it makes our gardening more interesting. Sweet William makes a nice border to the delphiniums and a large fragrant Mock Orange shrub nearby with bright colorful Tuberosa Begonias is a raised bed, sheltered from the wind and with some shade are a delight to the gardener.

Asilbes are lovely this year as they need a good deal of moisture and also some shade. I like the dwarf varieties and the creamy white and soft pink are in bloom

now. Daylilies and Plainstain Lilies need the same care as the Asilbes and the foliage is very attractive. They come in deep green and variegated leaves with pure white and also with mauve flowers, and have been grown in this garden for many years. Old plants can be divided and soon a large number are planted all over the garden in the shady spots.

Visitors to the garden have told me the varieties of flowers and shrubs that do well in their gardens at home. This week I have learned of many things pertaining to gardens in England, California, British Columbia and Arkansas and many other places, and it is a fine way to spend the summer days.

The little wood at the top of the garden is a happy spot to rest after a day of weeding and if you are blessed with trees and ferns, be sure to place a seat there for spare moments.

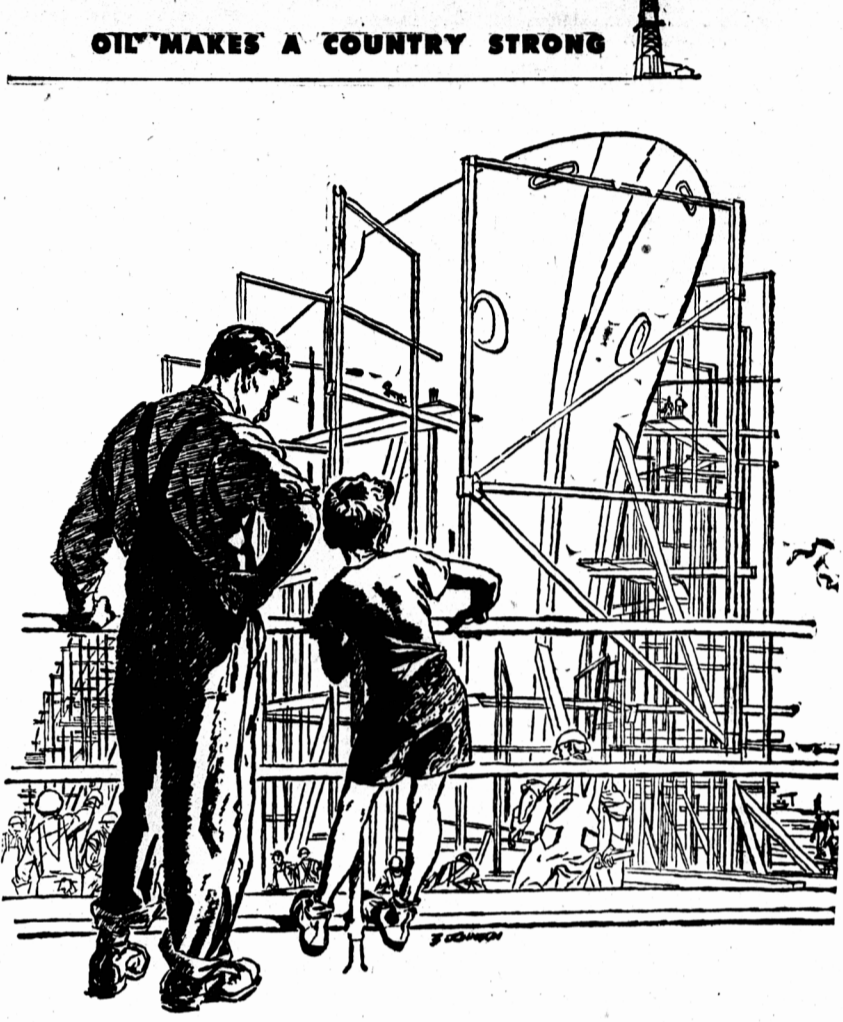
Lynn would do it if she found out he'd brought a fellow in out of the arrest, you know; he might have been a whitewinger, anything, on a wager!"

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP) — Joyce Matthews, former wife of comedian Milton Berle, attempted suicide today in the plush Ziegfeld Theatre apartment of showman Billy Rose. Police found her lying face down in a bathroom, unconscious and bleeding from slashed wrists.

Rose, who called police, said the blonde actress, 31, had barricaded herself in the bathroom and tried to kill herself.
