

# Seaman's All-Star Squad Wins Maritime Ch' ship

Charlottetown Seaman's All-Stars captured the Maritime five-pin bowling tournament staged in Shelburne, N.S., Wednesday through Saturday at the Shelburne alleys. Shearwater Flyers finished second to the Charlottetown outfit and the defending champion Greenwood Bombers placed third in the tourney.

Seaman's All-Stars fought an uphill battle throughout the tournament and after their first day of play they were in fourth place. There were nine teams entered in the competition.

After two days of competition they struggled into third position in the standings and on Saturday they met Shearwater and took six points off the navy outfit which was leading the standings at that point.

In a telephone conversation with Louis Smith, Saturday, he told us: "Stan Johnson was a big factor in the Charlottetown team being able to take the high flying Shearwater lads and this win spearheaded the team to the championship as it moved the local outfit into the top spot in the standings, two points up on Shearwater."

In the final game of the tourney the All-Stars were pitted against the Newfoundland representative and they needed to come out of the match with at least four points in order to clinch the championship.

In that final game the Charlottetown boys really came into their own and took six points off the Newfoundland band of bowlers to clinch the Maritime title. The first Maritime five-pin crown to come to the Island since 1960.

Smith told this writer: "George Kays bowled exceptionally well for the local squad in that crucial game against Newfoundland and without him we never could have won the championship, and Gordon Gallant played magnificent for us, as well as he ended up with a most respectable 213.8 average for the three day tourney."

In last year's tournament held at Charlottetown's Rollaway Club the Seamen aggregation finished in second place behind the Greenwood Bombers.

Ralph Glass of Shearwater posted the high single, 345, and Louis Smith nailed down the high triple award with a 594 count. Smith had strings of 322, 331 and 245. The Charlottetown team had the high game, 1,432, and the high match score, 3,737.

Sandy Jamieson of Shearwater, had the highest average, 255.8 and he was followed by Louis Smith with 246, Jim 'Shrimp' Williams 245, Ken Morton, Shelburne 242.4 and Ed Dale, Greenwood, 240.3.

The Charlottetown Rollaway Junior team got mixed in seventh position in the nine team competition. Summerside finished one up on the Rollaway Junior team.

Bill Doiron accompanied the Charlottetown teams and took care of the tournament scoring duties at the Shelburne alleys. At the closing banquet Doiron was presented with a trophy that Louis Smith described as probably the nicest of all the awards for his efforts.

# Plans Are Given For Hockey Clinic

The third annual Coaching Clinic for minor, school, college, university, and amateur hockey coaches, sponsored by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association in co-operation with the Department of National Health and Welfare's Fitness and Amateur Sports Directorate and the University of New Brunswick's Department of Physical Education, will be held at the Sir James Dunn Arena in St. Andrews, New Brunswick, from August 29 to September 4.

The Clinic is open to coaches from the four Atlantic Provinces and is one of five which will be held across Canada in the latter part of August. Others are scheduled for Montreal, Kingston, Winnipeg, and Edmonton. All are designed to improve the quality of hockey coaching at the amateur level.

Chairman of the Atlantic Area Institute is Dr. John W. Meagher, Head of the Physical Education Department at UNB. This will mark the third consecutive year that Dr. Meagher has served as Instructor and Chairman of the Planning Committee.

Chief Instructor for the 1965 Clinic will be Mr. R.J. McLennan, Sports Coordinator, New Brunswick Department of Youth and Welfare. Mr. McLennan has a wealth of experience as an amateur and professional hockey player and coach.

Mr. Vance Topper, former Director of Athletics at St. Thomas University will assist Mr. McLennan in the development of the Clinic program. Mr. Toner will be returning to the New Brunswick athletic and coaching field in August after a year of post-graduate study at Springfield College.

Mr. Howie Meeker, former Toronto Maple Leaf player and coach, will join the Clinic staff for the third consecutive year. He is considered one of the truly outstanding authorities on hockey in Canada today.

Mr. Ed Meagher, Director of Athletics and Hockey Coach at Montreal's Loyola High School, will join the staff lecturing in the area of coaching younger players. He brings to his position twenty years of high school coaching experience, and fourteen Montreal schoolboy championships.

Two additional staff members remain to be appointed. Negotiations are now under way with a top Ontario Junior A coach, and with a National Hockey League personality. An official announcement will be made after the Stanley Cup finals.

Coaches interested in attending the Clinic are urged to contact their Provincial MAHA representative or the office of their Provincial Director of Physical Education. A maximum of fifty coaches will be accepted: 21 from New Brunswick, 15 from Nova Scotia, 6 from Prince Edward Island, and 8 from Newfoundland. The deadline for applications has been set for May 20th.

NEW YORK (CP) — Needles Count ran away Saturday with the Preakness Prep at Aqueduct. The Prep was an exhibition race without betting and first prize was worth only \$3,900. It took Needles Count 1:47.35 to negotiate the 1.16 miles, more than five seconds slower than the Pimlico track record.

The track was muddy and that helped trainer Jim Malone decide to scratch Jacinto. The colt also had nicked himself on the right ankle, which he hurt two months ago and kept him from racing.

Steele Baru scored an upset in Pimlico's filly counterpart of the Preakness, the Black-Eyed Susan Stakes. She won by three quarters of a length over Wendy's Crown. Cavans Rose was a nose back for third.

Steele Baru earned \$15,583 for her owner, Mrs. Donelson Christmas. She paid \$146.40, \$18.00 and \$11.20. Wendy's Crown returned \$7.60 and \$6 and Cavans Rose \$19.

# Belgian Cyclists Triumph In Race

TORONTO (CP) — Rik Van Steenbergen of Belgium tied the world record for six-day bicycle race wins Saturday night when he and countryman Emile Severyns won the international six-day race here.

Van Steenbergen's win was the 38th in his 25-year career. The same number won by Torchy Peden, formerly of Victoria, B.C. and now of Northbrook, Ill.

Peden, who won his last victory just about the time Van Steenbergen won his first was the first to congratulate the Belgian as he drove across the finish line in Saturday's race.

Paced by the sensational riding of Severyns, the Belgians stole a lap on the field in the last 10 minutes of the race to wrap up the victory.

Until then, the Luxembourg team of Robert Lelange and Lucien Gillen had seemed sure winners as they drove seven sprints, each worth 72 points.

Sprint points are normally given on a 6-4-2-1 basis for the first four finishers in 10-lap races within the main marathon. They are used to break ties between teams which have covered the same number of total laps at the end of the race.

In the last hour sprinting is continuous and each sprint victory is worth 72 points to the winner.

The Italian team of Leandro Faggin and Mino de Rossi finished second, also lapsing the field in the last hour. They covered the same number of laps as the Belgians but had only 717 sprint points, compared with 717 for the Belgians.

In addition to the discussions on setting up a Canadian skeet organization, the delegates will decide on the program for Monday's shoot. The plan is to have an international style competition to enable shooters to get registered birds in this sport.

International skeet differs from North American skeet in two basic factors. In international skeet the gun must be held with the butt touching the shooters thigh or belt until the bird appears. In North American skeet the competitor is allowed to hold the gun to the shoulder when calling for the bird.

In international skeet the bird may be thrown from the trap at any time up to three seconds after the shooter calls for it. In North American skeet the bird is sprung with the shooter's call.

The meeting must also decide how it will determine the team which will represent Canada in the international postal match and where that match will be fired.

The inter-Maritime team match is the oldest team match in Canada and began in 1951. This match has been held each year since with the exception of the two world wars.
