Leader of U. K. Catholics III

LONDON (AP)—Bernard Cardinal Griffin, archbishop of Westminster and spiritual leader of Britain's Roman Catholics, suffered a heart attack Tuesday but a statement from the archbishop's house, Westminster, said he is resting comfortably. The cardinal is 56. He has been ailing for some years. Cardinal Griffin was born in Birmingham and was educated at Cotton College, Oscott, English College, Rome, and Beda College, Rome. He was ordained a priest in 1924 and became archbishop of Westminster in 1943. He became a cardinal in 1946. Cardinal Griffin has suffered from high blood pressure. Early in 1951 he became gravely ill after a heart attack. He was anointed on that occasion. This is part of the Sacrament of Extreme Unction. He made such progress that within three months he returned to duties in London. There are about 3,500,000 Roman Catholics in Britain.

King's County Farmers Hold Annual Meeting

Mr. Valentine Mullally, Souris, was elected president of the Kings County Federation of Agriculture at the annual meeting held in the Montague High School auditorium last night. Mr. Lloyd Martin, provincial president presided over the meeting. Other officers include first vice-president, Mrs. Abdin Howlett, Gowan Brae; second vice-president, Mrs. Arthur MacKinnon, Brooklyn; secretary, John Mullally, Souris. Following the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting by the provincial secretary, Mr. J. L. Dewar, the resolutions committee was appointed including Wilfred MacDonald, Abdin Howlett, Charles Mellish and Mrs. Bert Hicken. Mr. Martin addressed the meeting briefly stating that more interest in the Federation on behalf of the farmers was required and that this would be exemplified by an increased membership. He stressed co-operation between the producer, dealers and other media in the production and marketing of primary products, and that the farmer should make every effort to know how his potatoes were marketed. Mr. J. L. Dewar spoke interestingly and instructively on the farm radio forum stating that the program was designed to help the farmer and to show him the need for co-operation with other primary producers in his own province, and with producers of similar products in other provinces. Mr. Dewar went on to discuss accident insurance for farmers and stated that during the past year there had been a steady increase. PANEL DISCUSSION Under the chairmanship of Mr. W. R. Shaw, a panel discussion was held. The members of the panel were Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, Souris, and Mr. Russell Buell, Abney. Several topics were discussed leading off with the problem of production and how it affected the whole economic system. The problem of marketing received a lengthy discussion and the members of the panel explained the intricacies of marketing in a complex society where the old time system of producer to consumer no longer sufficed. The need of many other services, such as the assembler, transportation services, warehouse and storage services, brokers, and others was clearly explained. In the problem of distribution attention was centered on specific markets in U. S. A., South America, West Indies, and the home market in Canada. It was pointed out that although a considerable portion of seed was exported, that the largest percentage of Island potatoes was sold as tablestock and that to the local market in Canada. Regarding the marketing of turnips, it was stated by the panel that the whole marketing system of this commodity was in a muddle, and Mr. D.A. MacDonald said that no other business could survive in the present turnip marketing system. The chairman stated that control was required for such marketing in order to bring it into some semblance of orderly marketing. Mr. Reid stated that producers were dumping on the Boston market and Mr. MacDonald said that others were shipping on consignment basis.

Furthermore we strongly urge our Government to make the necessary amendments to the Uniformity of Time Act to make it enforceable at the next session of the Legislature. Whereas accurate daily market information is of value to potato growers and whereas the Potato Market Board would appear to be the proper source of such information, be it resolved that the Potato Board be urged to frequently publicize the potato prices which the farmer should receive.
