Georgetown lost one of its eldest and most highly respected citizens in the passing on Monday, April 29th of Mr. Robert Jeffrey, whose death took place at his home following a lengthy illness in his 86th year.

The deceased was born at Little River, Prince Edward Island in 1871 and took up residence in Georgetown 70 years ago. He was married to the former Persilla Gallant of Rustico, who predeceased him 7 years ago.

He leaves to mourn one son, Son, Elmer, of Georgetown and two daughters, Alice at home and Catherine (Mrs. Albert MacLeod of Charlottetown, also one brother Mr. John Jeffrey of Georgetown.
