THE barque "Claribel" arrived at Hawkesbury, C. B., on Saturday, 18 days from Liverpool. This vessel proceeds to Baie Verte to load deals for Liverpool. She will then follow the barque "Wm. Owen" with general cargo.

JOHN T. MCKINNON, shipping master at Port Caledonia, C. B., was killed on the 27th by falling into the forehold of the steamer "Red Water." He was highly respected, and much sympathy is felt for the large family he left.

THERE are rumors in Buffalo, N. Y., that Captain Webb escaped death at the whirlpool, and that he is laying low to enable his friends to make money by betting on his reappearance. But notwithstanding such report, the generally received belief is that he is dead.

THE United States Treasury Department is notified that residents of New Haven, Conn., are much alarmed at the fact that a cargo of Egyptian rags has arrived there, consigned to a paper mill. The Marine Hospital service has replied that there is little danger if the rags are immediately placed in vats of chloride of lime, as it is proposed to do.

REV. HENRY WARD BEECHER has explicitly declared his belief in evolution, which he does not consider inconsistent with a faith in the Christian doctrine, or necessitating a mental conformity to the agnosticism of Spencer, Huxley and Tyndall. He declares his disbelief of the story of the fall of Adam and the inheritance of guilt.

CRICKET.—The match on Saturday resulted in the defeat of the "Veterans" by forty runs and two wickets to fall. For the match team Haythorne, T. A. LePage and L. Yeo did some splendid batting, the former scoring 30 runs. For the Veterans W. Anderson, Johnson, Findley and L. H. Davies played well. The Veterans were at a disadvantage in that many of them lacked practice. Still they played a plucky game. The match will be repeated Saturday next, when the Veterans hope to have a stronger team. J. A. Longworth was captain of the Match Team, and L. H. Davies of the Veterans.

THE anniversary sermon of the Prince Street Sunday School was preached last evening by the Rev. J. W. Wadman, A. B., the children occupying the galleries of the church and conducting the singing. The sermon was exceedingly appropriate to the occasion, abounding in beautiful illustration, and was delivered with unusual fervor and eloquence. We are proud of Mr. Wadman as a native of the Island, and welcome him as a valuable acquisition to our staff of city clergymen. He comes to us from the church in Fredericton to assume the pastorate of the Second Methodist Church here.

A Conflict of Authority.

OTTAWA, July 29. A conflict of authority has arisen between Ontario and Manitoba officials at Rat Portage in the disputed territory. The Manitoba Government have called on the Dominion Government for assistance which will doubtless be granted. The Ontario Government mean to defend the rights of their Province at any cost.

The Telegraph Strike.

PITTSBURG, July 28. The Knights of Labor throughout the country, by an assessment of 6 1/2 cents per head, will, on Monday, be enabled to place \$100,000 in the hands of the Executive Committee of the Telegraph Brotherhood. Secretary Hughes says they will continue the battle till January, if necessary.

The Cholera.

ALEXANDRIA, July 28. There were two deaths from Cholera in Alexandria to-day.

LONDON, July 28. The number of cases of cholera reported at Cairo, Damietta, Ghizeh, and other places, is terrible.

A Successful Feat.

LONDON, July 29. Terryman, who left Dover at 9 o'clock yesterday morning on a floating tricycle, with the intention of crossing the English Channel, arrived safely at Calais at 5 p. m.

St. John County Election.

ST. JOHN, July 30. Mr. George Macleod has expressed his willingness to offer for the vacancy in the representation of St. John County caused by Mr. Elder's death.

Telegraph Notes.

The Pope is indisposed. The Spanish Cortes has been prorogued. Probably it will not meet again until December.

Hon. Montgomery Blair died at his residence near Washington at three Friday morning.

Robt. B. Beath, of Philadelphia, was elected Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Thursday evening.

It is stated at Berlin that Prof. Zupulitz, who committed suicide on Thursday, killed himself because he had drawn the death lot in the so-called American duel.

A special states it was reported in Monterrey on the 27th, that the Spanish Minister to Mexico had been recalled and a serious rupture between the two countries is possible.

Henry Welch and wife, and Miss Alice Swartz were killed at the Frakering Crossing of the Pennsylvania Railroad, near Lancaster, on Friday, while trying to cross the track ahead of an express train.

Late estimates place the liabilities of the Ward Iron Company, Cleveland, O., at \$300,000, while the available assets are said to be less than \$5,000. The wife of James Ward is said to have property to meet all liabilities.

Over one hundred persons in attendance at a lawn party at Jobet, Ill., last evening were made seriously ill by eating ice cream, which it is believed contained poison. None of the victims have died, though several are in a critical condition.

Count Kalnaky had an interview on Thursday with Count Von Bulow, the Prussian minister. Certain importance is attached in Vienna to the cordial reception by Emperor William of Count Kalnaky. The latter has received free from the Emperor the decoration.

Lord Carlington, the President of the Council, stated in the House of Lords, on the 27th, that the Government had no intention of enforcing quarantine against shipping arriving at English ports, as it was thought impossible to establish an absolute quarantine system. He said medical inspection would be adopted.

A duel with pitchforks took place at High Grove, Nelson county yesterday, between two farm laborers, Daniel Wilkes, colored, and John McDougal, white. They got into a quarrel and decided to fight. Wilkes procured a long-handled, two pronged fork and McDougal a short-handled one with four prongs. They fought it out alone, and both are likely to die.
