Cardigan Member Raises Lively Discussion Over Politics And Contracts

"During the year 1953-54 the Department of Highways under-spent \$153,000 and in 1954-55 they under-spent \$370,000," said Mr. John A. MacDonald when he resumed the debate on the Budget address in the Legislature yesterday. "This would be enough to pave the road from Miramira to Wood Islands," he added.

Continuing Mr. MacDonald said, "When the Trans-Canada Highway was started, Prince and Kings County were assured that they would receive additional road work to compensate for the amount being spent on the major project."

Hon. Mr. MacKinnon: "You will be surprised when I show you that you got more than your share."

Mr. MacDonald: "That is not what the report shows. I must appeal to the Minister on a matter of late roadwork being done in the Third District. I find that in many parts this work was continued far too late in the season and people do not take the time to such procedure. Shale is not standing up nearly so well as gravel, and in many places sections of the road so treated become very greasy and dangerous."

Mr. Saville Discusses Government Assistance To Processing Plants

A word of warning was sounded by George Saville (L. Fifth Kings) to the Department of Industry in its selection of areas for the promotion of processing plants in the Province. "Care should be exercised in the establishment of such plants. It would be bad to have a new plant in competition with one which had been established for years."

Mr. Saville noted with regret that a great many lobster factories had closed down in preference to selling live lobsters to the buyers. He felt that this was a mistake since many people were deprived of employment. He urged the fishermen to take careful consideration of this procedure in case they might find themselves at the mercy of the buyers and have no alternative but to sell to them.

The Fifth Kings member observed that the revenue of the Province has increased greatly during the past twenty years but that the demands upon the Government had kept pace with the increase. Nevertheless, he said, a great deal more remains to be done. He had words of praise for the method employed in making roads and said that
