DEATH OF A NEW BRUNSWICKER AT SEA.—The sad intelligence has been received by his family at Point Du Chene of the death, in the beginning of March last (apparently on the 9th), of Nelson H. Hanington, mate of the "Mary J. Cooke." The deceased came to his death by being struck—while on a voyage from Para to Brazil—by a broken spar. The blow was so severe that he never spoke afterwards and lived only till next day. He was buried at sea. The deceased was brother of Mr. George L. Hanington and half brother of Miss Ida Schurman, both of the Point du Chene House. They recently met with a severe trial in the burning of that hotel, as all their family souvenirs and ornaments were destroyed by the fire. This fresh trial will be a heavy blow to them. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Information Telegraphed For.

LONDON, July 13.
In reply to the demand of England as to the conduct of the French troops in Tamatave, France has informed England that she has telegraphed for an official report from Madagascar. In the House of Lords, Lord Granville, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, declined to make any statement with reference to the matter.

Cholera Spreading.

CAIRO, July 13.
Cholera is rapidly spreading in this direction, many cases being reported within thirty miles of the city.

Heavy Floods in Ontario.

LONDON, Ont., July 13.
This vicinity has been visited with very heavy rains. A late report says that twenty persons are known to be drowned owing to overflow of the Thames River.

British Merchants Searched.

LONDON, July 13.
The French authorities at Gaboon have caused the British merchants to be searched and fined if arms are found in their possession. Great indignation is expressed at this treatment.

Incendiarism in Ireland.

DUBLIN, July 13.
The crops on the estate of Mr. Errington, British Representative at the Vatican, have been burned it is supposed by incendiaries.

Telegraph Notes.

Egypt has refused Great Britain the offer of medical aid.

The Very Rev. Archibald Boyd, D. D., religious writer is dead.

A prolonged shock of earthquake was felt at Lima on the 10th inst.

Sixteen deaths from cholera occurred at Samarang on the 10th, and eight at Tanta. On Wednesday there were 62 deaths from cholera at Damietta, 50 at Mensurah, 30 at Samarang and 15 at Shirbin.

The Island of Anticosti, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, will be sold in September next, to redeem the mortgages upon it.

A special cablegram says the Marquis of Lansdowne, the new Governor-General, will sail for Canada on the 11th of October.

A despatch from Beckenried, Switzerland says that nearly all the cultivated land in that district has been ruined by storms and a land slip.

A despatch from Durban on the 9th says that a great battle was fought between the forces of Cetewayo and those of Oham. The latter chief was captured.

News has been received in Paris that China has appointed M. Makien, a Europeanized diplomat, to negotiate with M. Tricou, French Minister, relative to Tonquin affairs.

The Canadian marksmen at Wimbledon have made a good start. Mitchell, Langstroth, Ashall, Ross, Smith, Clarke, Corby and Munro have each won £2 in the Alexandria match.

There is great excitement among Ecuadorians at the triumph over the disaster at Guayaquil. News by steamer confirms the telegrams that the Congress at Arquipa has declared for peace.

The "Standard's" correspondent at Paris says that in order to secure influence over the canal the British Government will find the capital for the new canal company, which is to pay only small interest.

An Australian despatch says that both houses of the Victorian Parliament have unanimously voted an address to the Queen, urging the annexing and the establishment of a protectorate over New Guinea and other Pacific islands, and offering to share the expense of such action.

A letter to General Lynch, dated Parma, July 7, reports that Colonel Urriola dispersed a number of Monteneros on the 4th inst., in Concepcion, killing 75 of them and losing only one of his men. On the 6th inst., he encountered another party at Pacao, killing six men, among them Col. Rios, sub-prefect of Anja.

The French astronomers sent to Caroline Island, in the South Pacific, to study the solar eclipse of May 6, have arrived at San Francisco. They report finding a red star, which it is believed will prove a new discovery. The eclipse lasted 5 minutes and 32 seconds. They noticed several new features in the corona, chiefly a white prominence supposed to be vapor or white clouds.

Advices dated June 6th, from Gaboon, the capital of the French colony of that name, on the west coast of Africa, state that the French commandant there has arbitrarily searched English merchants, and fined those having arms in their possession, and has interfered with the schools of American missionaries, refusing to permit the teaching of any language but French.

The pauper emigrants returned to Ireland by order of the American authorities on the steamers Furnessia and Spain were landed at Queenstown yesterday. All accounts agree in describing them as a wretched class of people. One family, consisting of man, wife and five children, were left lying on the wharf for three hours before the officials, who were not advised of their coming, provided for their wants.

The Masonic Grand Lodge of Canada is now in session at Ottawa. The Grand Master's report shows that from 1867 to 1875, the Grand Lodge expended in benevolence \$32,886, and from 1876 to 1882, both years inclusive, \$71,396 52, or nearly \$10,200 a year has been expended in aiding those requiring assistance during the last seven years. The receipts of the Grand Lodge for the year ended 31st May, 1883,

were \$18,044; the total expenditure, \$15,524; excess of receipts, \$2,520. Cash on hand on the same date, \$67,719.

Thames River, at London, Ont., has risen to an extraordinary height, causing great destruction of property. Eight houses have been carried away, three persons are known to be drowned, and it is feared the number will reach a much larger figure. A large number of persons are missing, but it is not known definitely that they are drowned. Barns have been carried away by the score and railroad travel is cut off by washouts. Kensington bridge and Oxford street bridge, are gone, also a large section of the bridge on proof lines at Ladies bridge. The steamer "Princess Louise" floated down stream and carried away the Byron bridge. Cattle, horses, etc., have been drowned by hundreds.

The friends of Kennedy hope that before the season closes he will take Lee at his word and row him a match race for \$1,000 a side.

The championship race for \$1,000 a side and \$2,000 given by the public of Ogdensburg, N. Y., will take place at 5 o'clock on Wednesday, July 18, on the St. Lawrence River. The distance is four miles, two miles with turn. Many people wonder, says the Boston "Herald" why Ross should row Hanlan, when it is so generally conceded that Wallace will be defeated. That the race did not take place before is certainly a fault of Ross, for he has been trying to get on the race for two years. Ross, the last time the men met, defeated Hanlan at Providence, and his friends claim that he is a great deal better man now than he was then. The general opinion is, however, that it may be a good race for a mile or less, and that Hanlan will then go in and win as he pleases. There are a few, however, who believe that Ross will defeat Hanlan. It comes from good sources that Kennedy is of the opinion that Hanlan is almost sure to win.

The Boston *Herald* says: "The improvement shown by Hosmer in his races this year proves that he possesses strength and speed and all that is wanted is more head work. In previous races Hosmer has gone off with a rush and used up his powers, which should have been saved for the end of his race. George is now rowing very fast. Foolishly enough, he rowed a two-mile trial over the Lowell course two days before the late regatta, and made remarkable time, but he should have placed the timer in hands other than Hanlan's. It is true that the champion and Hosmer are great friends, but there are things that an oarsman should keep secret, and rowing on time for one who is not a backer seems to be a matter wanting in judgment. Hosmer is willing to row Gaudaur and several others who claim to be fast. It is to be hoped that George will fall into good hands, and that he will have several matches on before the season is over."
