

Legion Credit To Town Says Mayor Of Borden

The Borden branch of the Canadian Legion, described by Mayor Willard Leard, as "a credit to themselves and to the town of Borden", were seen in a practical demonstration of this quality when they presented \$100 to the Prince County Hospital at their annual Remembrance Day banquet in the legion home last evening.

In accepting from president Wilbert Muttart the donation which makes the branch a member of the Prince County Hospital Centenary Club, J. F. Arnett, a member of the Hospital Board of Trustees, acknowledged the importance of this contribution from the Borden Legion, which he said, helps make it possible to keep open the doors of this very important institution which they should consider as their hospital, and their donation also helped make it possible for the hospital to be prepared to take care of any, who through sudden sickness or accident, have entered the hospital for care or treatment.

The principal speaker at the dinner, served by the ladies auxiliary, was Lt.-Cmdr. J.C. Kenny, Commanding Officer of the naval training barracks at Charlottetown. He said that the navy has enjoyed the support of the Canadian Legion, and he cited the outstanding contribution given to the Sea Cadet movement by the Legion in Summerside which he said is almost unparalleled in Canada.

Lt.-Cmdr. Kenny announced that the Queen Charlotte Naval Training Division expected to move into their new building in Charlottetown in December. He said that the role of the navy is principally for the protection of trade, but because Canada has practically no merchant ships left in service, it becomes one of protecting shipborne commerce to and from this country.

He said that the work of the Navy is becoming primarily concerned with its anti-submarine role, and in this responsibility it works closely with Maritime Air Command. Referring to the changing demands in naval defence requirements he said it has been suggested that the entire naval role of the future may be an underwater operation. While expressing the hope that peace would prevail throughout the world, he said the best means of avoiding war appeared to be one of preparedness.

Wing Commander L. Limpert, of RCAF Station, Summerside, in his toast to the legion, recalled that Remembrance Day had been developed largely through the efforts of the Canadian Legion. He said it was of the utmost importance that the free world develop a concept of the dangers facing it today, and he pointed out that acceptance of assistance from the Soviet bloc Conkey.

The parade, which assembled at the legion home, marched to the war memorial, where the following speakers paid tribute to the departed comrades; Deputy Mayor Wendall Birt, Rev. John Cash and Rev. Nathan Mair. Bruce L. Stewart was guest speaker for the occasion.

The Branch President, Joseph Hennessy, recited the poem "They Shall Grow Not Old", followed by the Last Post, two minutes silence and Reveille. Mrs. H.D. MacLean, representative of motherhood, placed the first wreath, followed by Deputy Mayor Birt, Joseph Hennessy, Mrs. Margaret Jarvis for the Ladies Auxiliary, next of kin and others.

Mrs. Michael placed a wreath in memory of her son who was killed in the first world war. The salute was taken by Deputy Mayor Birt in front of the legion home, and the parade continued to the east end of the town, returning to the Home where the band presented a short program.
