U.S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel prices in the United States rose more than one of the biggest log jams of the industry in the United States.

The metalworking weekly lists these four reasons why the price advances have not yet hurt demand:

1. Steel consumers' business is good, they need steel.

2. The brief work stoppage before steel industry contracts were signed, the July 4 independence holiday and summer vacations have slowed the flow of steel to consumers.

3. Consumers will pass on as much of the increase as they can. The magazine's price composite on steelmaking scrap rose to \$38.57 a gross ton last week, an 84-cent jump over the preceding week. The finished steel price composite stayed firm at \$125.64 a net ton.

Steel mills, recovering from a brief steel strike and holiday week-end, operated at 88 per cent of rated capacity, 3.5 points above the previous week and four points below the year's high point.

Butter Surplus

OTTAWA (CP)—Perhaps only a drought can pull the government out of a butter crisis.

The government already has lost more than \$1,000,000 in its 1955 butter deals, but despite offerings, officials estimate there still is a large stockpile of 1954 butter to be sold.

And now the country is in full swing, producing its usual summer surplus of butter for storage and sale in the winter months.

Production has been increasing, but officials have noted that a period of hot, dry weather has dried some pastures and reduced the milk flow in July. A continuation of such a trend could turn the butter surplus into valuable reserve. But it would be unusual for such a trend to continue for any length of time.

AGAINST SUBSIDIES

Some federal officials have suggested that perhaps more of the surplus could be sold on the Canadian market. If prices were drastically reduced for the general butter.

But the federal treasury is generally against consumer subsidies, on the grounds that if they are used for one product, producers of other products may also demand such aid.

Federal officials are still cutting around, searching for some way of getting rid of the butter without disturbing the Canadian price structure. They say they have a critical job before them and if they do not succeed some of the 1954 butter may spoil by next summer if still in storage by that time.

TORONTO (CP)—Bathurst Mining Corp. Ltd. and Maritimes Mining Corp. Ltd. have announced that payment has been received from the New Brunswick Trust Co. covering an additional 250,000 shares of each company at \$2 a share, comprising part of the Dec. 29 option instalment under the underwriting and option agreement of March 29.

MONTREAL (CP)—Southern Canadian Power Company reported gross earnings of \$739,584 for the month of June, an increase of \$65,683 over last year's June figure. Net earnings were \$134,014, an increase of \$4,415.

For the nine-month period ended June 30, 1955 gross earnings increased \$508,468 to \$6,603,426 over the corresponding nine months in 1954 while net earnings of \$1,244,775 were \$68,120 higher.

Debate on the army bill, which goes to the upper house for approval this week, revolved mostly around nuclear war and defence of German population, and the timing of this first step toward raising the planned German defence force of 500,000 men.

Theodor Blank, West German defence minister, said the raising of a German army is necessary because ground troops are still essential in a modern war, and in addition there is a real possibility that both sides in a future war would hesitate to use their atomic weapons.

In this case, Russian superiority in ground troops would remain the decisive weapon, he said, and there would be a permanent danger that West Germany would be overrun by Soviet tanks in the first stages of a future war, a danger greatly reduced by the raising of German divisions.

The four government parties, Christian Democrats, Free Democrats, Refugee party and German party, voted for the bill with few exceptions. The Social Democrats voted solidly against.
