MOVING OF BUILDINGS

The attention of the Public is directed to Section 35 of The Highway Traffic Act which reads as follows:

"No person shall move any building or buildings on any highway in this Province unless he has first procured a permit from the Minister of Public Works and Highways authorizing him to move such building or buildings. In granting a permit under this section, the Minister of Public Works and Highways may require that the building or buildings be moved under such conditions as he may impose and every such permit shall be carried by the person engaged in moving such building or buildings to which it refers and shall be open to inspection by any Police Officer."

SALLY SLY CHEATS HERSELF

Who doth his neighbor seek to cheat Himself is cheating as is meet. —Old Mother Nature

Sally Sly the Cowbird is selfish. In all the Green Meadows there is no one quite like her, no one who thinks so wholly of self. She has no thought for anything or any one but self and her own pleasure. Of course, she isn't liked by her neighbors. Selfish people never are liked by their neighbors. Selfishness and likeableness never go together. No, sir, they never do.

All Sally Sly thinks of is having a good time, doing what she wants to do when she wants to do it, and going where she pleases when she pleases. So she thinks children are a nuisance; that they need too much time and attention, not to mention too much hard work, to keep them properly fed. What does she do about it? She sneaks about trying to be herself unseen while watching her neighbors to find out where they are making their homes. She is very clever about it. Sneaks often are clever in unpleasant ways. And all the time she is doing it she thinks she is smart to cheat her neighbors into doing something they don't want to do, into raising her children for her.

In a way she is smart. She hunts for the nests of folks smaller than herself. Of course, their eggs will be smaller than hers and of course from a bigger egg will hatch a bigger baby. And, of course a bigger baby will be a stronger baby. So it will be sure to get a bigger share of food and will grow faster than the other babies in the nest. Also Sally Sly long ago discovered that the deeper a nest is the less likely it is that one of her eggs will be thrown or kicked out. She likes especially the cup like nests of Redeye the Vireo and others of the Vireo folk, and of Sunshiner the Yellow Warbler. When she can't find nests of these folk she lays her eggs in such nests as she can find.

Now honest feathered folk lay all their eggs in one nest. Of course, they want all their babies together where they can watch over and care for them until they are ready to go out into the Great World. Not so Sally Sly. She lays but one egg in a nest. If she lays more than one, the owners of the nest might desert it and build another.

Contract Bridge

"THEORY" DOES NOT ALWAYS WORK OUT

Most expert pairs would prefer to play today's deal at four hearts rather than at the three-notrump contract, actually reached, and theoretically they would be right. The North-South pair, however, had reason to congratulate themselves on being "unscientific."

North thought for a long time before passing to three notrump, but he finally decided that since he had already announced good heart support, and since South had nevertheless shown a disinclination to bid game at the major suit, three notrump might be the easier contract. This was a questionable decision, but it was certainly justified by the result! Four hearts could not have been made, whereas South managed to bring home a three notrump. West opened the diamond king and continued with the suit, declarer holding up his ace until the third round. (A shift by West would not have furthered his cause.) Now, since South would certainly have to lose at least one heart trick, and since he could not keep West off lead if the defender had the heart king, South led a low heart to the queen. East won and made the only safe return, a club. Dummy took this trick with the ace, and a low spade was now led toward the closed hand. East could not afford to put up the ace—that would have given South two natural spade tricks—and when he played low, South's queen, of course, held.

Now South ran three more club tricks—to East's acute embarrassment! Dummy was reduced to the K-8 of spades and the J-4 of hearts. East could not give up a heart without letting South run the suit, so he had to blank the spade ace. South promptly led his spade nine, ducked in dummy, and then could claim the contract.

No Floor Under Cod This Year

OTTAWA, June 30 — (CP)—The Government is not planning to set a floor price under this year's catch of eastern cod but will buy salt cod still being held by Newfoundland fishermen from last year. Fisheries Minister Mayhew, making the announcement in the Commons, said the support buying would not cover stocks held by exporters but that other steps were being taken to help them dispose of their holdings. The Minister said he would give an answer later to a question from G. F. Higgins (P.C.-St. John's West) on whether one of these steps was the proposed conversion of ster-

Sugar Stocks Down

OTTAWA, June 30 — (CP)—Refinery stocks of raw and refined sugar were lower at the end of May than at the same time a year ago, the Bureau of Statistics reported. Raw sugar stocks fell from 115,931,000 pounds last year to 96,300,000 pounds this year.

and refined sugar from 228,748,000 pounds to 180,795,000. Receipts of raw sugar rose in May to 162,332,000 pounds from 144,862,000. Output of refined sugar during the month advanced from 99,639,000 pounds to 129,891,000.
