President's report for year 1950-51 is as follows:  
During the year just past nine meetings were held. No meeting was held during February due to the prevalence of "flu" and the decision to hold our March meet-

ing early in the month to tie in with Education Week.

**Programs**

Films were shown at two meetings, May and November, the subjects being "Youth in your Town," "Traffic Safety," and "First Aid." Dr. L. W. Shaw addressed us in October, Mr. Clarence Mercer in November and January, and Miss Smith, Public Health Nurse, in April. The December meeting featured a discussion on "Discipline," led by Miss E. Bowness, and in March a discussion on "Education" was led by four members of the Public Speaking Class of Community College. The September meeting took the form of a banquet with entertainment. Representatives of other Home and School groups attended the October meeting in response to our invitation and during the same month several of our members attended the Kensington group meeting. Refreshments were served by our social committee on several occasions and by the Grade IX Homemakers Class after the March meeting.

**Projects**

Our projects were:  
(1) Support of the music room by voting financial assistance which later materialized in the purchase of a piano.  
(2) Presenting prizes at the school closing for students showing the greatest improvement in Grade I to IX.  
(3) Promotion and financial support of a sewing class for adults.  
(4) Presentation of a trophy to classrooms having the largest representation of parents at Home and School meetings.  
(5) Arranging for economical distribution of cod liver oil capsules to the younger children in the school.  
(6) Supporting "Education Week" program in the school by an advertisement in the press.

**Congratulations**

At this point I wish to congratulate Mr. Mercer and his helpers upon the successful organization and conduct of the Community College program which has done a

great deal to develop the "lighted school house" idea and to bring many citizens into a closer relationship with the school.

The Summerside Y's Men's Club and the Summerside Board of Trade are to be commended upon their sponsorship of parts of this project.  
The Rotary Club also deserves high commendation for sponsoring and assisting financially the Junior Traffic Control Organization which, under the supervision of Mr. J. Murphy, is functioning efficiently for the safety of students on the streets near the school.

The very excellent display of students' work projects which was seen in the auditorium during Education Week reflected the interest and efficiency of the teaching staff as well as the industry of the pupils themselves. I consider that we have a very progressive school deserving the interested support of every citizen.

In closing I wish to thank the officers, directors, committees and members of this Group for their wholehearted support in carrying out the past year's program of work, and also the local press and radio for publicizing our work and meetings.

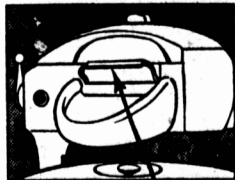

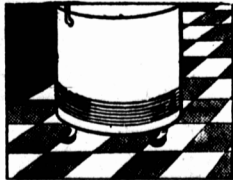

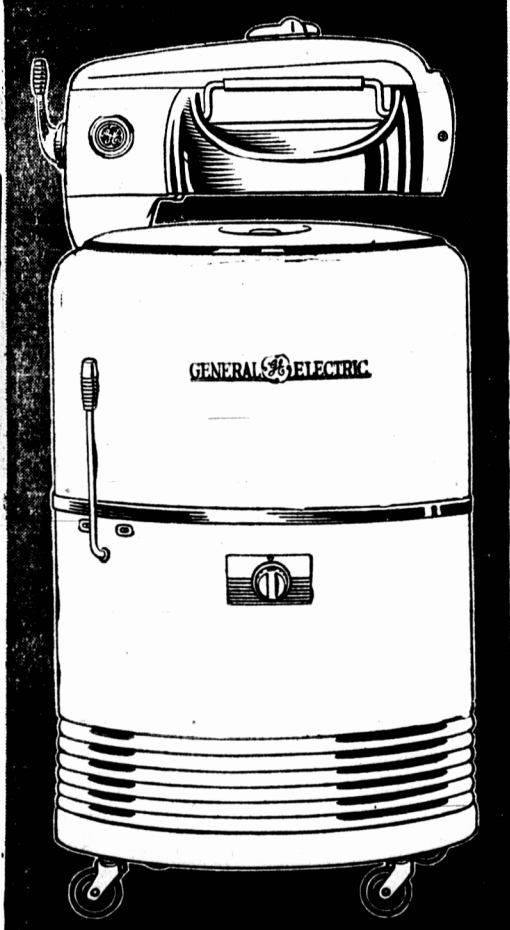
