(1) **TRAFFIC ENGINEER**—should be a graduate of a recognized university, with preferably post-graduate or special class qualifications in traffic engineering, and with a minimum of five years experience in traffic study and engineering in a principal city or town.

(2) **DESIGN ENGINEER**—in CHARGE OF DESIGN—this appointee will take charge of the Design Branch of the Department, consisting of all design work embracing bridges, structures, sewers, roads and sidewalks. This position calls for a senior design engineer with municipal experience.

(3) **DESIGN ENGINEER**—responsible for the design of bridges, structures, sewers, roads and sidewalks, under the direction of the Branch Engineer.

(4) **ENGINEER IN CHARGE OF PLANNING**—responsible for the administration of the Planning Branch of the Department and to advise on matters of planning, including subdivision control, zoning and land politics. Preference for a graduate engineer with post-graduate or professional qualifications in town planning.

(5) **ASSOCIATE ROADWAY ENGINEER**—appointee will be in charge of Roadways Branch of the Department, and should have a wide experience in modern methods of road, street, and sidewalk design, construction and maintenance.

(6) **SENIOR ROADWAYS ENGINEER**—responsible for the supervision of large roadway contracts and to be departmental contract administrator. This position requires an engineer with about five years experience in roadway design, construction and maintenance.

(7) **MECHANICAL ENGINEER**—To be responsible for Civic Work Shops, garage, plant equipment and transports under direction of the Branch Engineer. Should have wide experience in shop maintenance and repairs, and modern civic engineering and highways construction maintenance and cleansing equipment.

(8) **RESIDENT SEWER ENGINEER**—responsible for the laying-out and supervision of storm and sanitary sewer construction, and to be departmental contract administrator. Experience since graduation should include contract control.

(9) **SENIOR SEWER ENGINEER**—responsible for the supervision of sewer construction and the preparation of estimates and progress reports. This position requires an engineer with about five years experience in sewer construction.

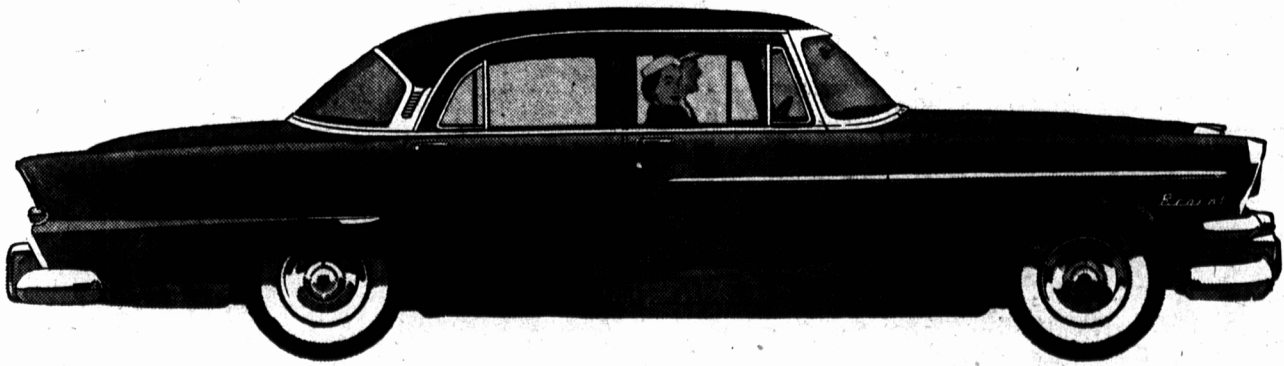
