

# Tigers Shutout Red Sox; Yankees Grab Twin Bill

Using a dazzling assortment of breaking stuff, Detroit Tiger ace Jim Bunning pitched a brilliant 3-0 no-hit win over Boston Red Sox Sunday.

The righthander struck out 12 men in the first game of a doubleheader. Ike Delock salvaged a 5-2 nightcap win for Boston. It was unbeaten Delock's tenth victory.

Bunning did it the hard way, winding up the ninth inning by striking out Gene Stephens and Ted Lepcio and getting the Sox's magnificent veteran Ted Williams on a long fly to right field.

The somber gum-chewing Kentuckian survived a nerve-tensing first inning in his mound masterpiece. It was the first no-hitter in the major leagues since Bob Keegan of Chicago White Sox defeated Washington 6-0 last Aug. 20.

Bunning gave up two walks and hit a batter.

Stephens almost broke up the bid as the first batter to face Bunning in the first inning. Gene tagged a towering drive to right but Al Kaline backed up against the low fence to haul it in.

ADD TO SUSPENSE  
Pete Runnels added to the suspense in the first when, entering the game as the league's top batsman, he nearly got an infield single. Second baseman Ossie Virgil had to knock the ball down, chase it, and gun his throw to first.

Detroit collected all its runs off loser Frank Sullivan in the fifth.

In other American League action Sunday, Baltimore edged Cleveland 3-2 in 10 innings, Washington split with Chicago, losing the first 4-2 and winning the second 5-4 while New York swept both games from Kansas City 3-1 and 5-0.

All games Sunday in the National League were single contests. San Francisco whipped Pittsburgh 7-3, Los Angeles blanked the Phillies 6-0, Milwaukee took Chicago Cubs 4-2 and St. Louis topped Cincinnati 3-1.

At Baltimore Sunday, Joe Ginsberg's bases-loaded single in the 10th drove in the winning run for the Orioles.

Ginsberg ruined Cleveland manager Joe Gordon's strategy. He had ordered Gene Woodling and Bob Nieman walked intentionally after Bob Boyd opened the tenth with a triple off loser Hoyt Wilhelm.

FORD EARNS SHUTOUT  
At New York, it was Whitey Ford who blanked the Athletics on five hits in the second game of their twin-bill. Yogi Berra's worn homer won the opener. Jerry Lumpe homered with two on in the third inning of the Ford whitewash effort to make the task a little easier.

At Washington, Roy Sievers ninth inning homer off reliever Early Wynn gave the Senators their 5-4 nightcap win.

Dick Donovan's five-hit pitch-

ing killed the Senators in the opener.

In the National League, the defending world champion Braves broke loose with two runs in the ninth inning to take the Cubs 4-2. Ace lefty Warren Spahn got the win through a five-hit effort.

The Cardinals relied on the pinpoint control of Sad Sam Jones to smother the Reds with a seven-hitter. Jones chipped in with a single in the fourth inning helping the Cards pick up an early lead and protected it from the mound the rest of the way.

RETAIL TOP SPOT  
Routing ace righthander Bob Friend with five hits in the first inning, the Giants coasted to their win and retained their half-game hold on first place.

Meanwhile at the other end of the heap, the Dodgers vaulted out of the cellar by their win over the Phillies. The victory came on the four-hit pitching of John Podres.

## Shamrocks Win Doubleheader

The B.I.S. Shamrocks moved to within striking distance of a fourth play-off spot over the weekend by sweeping a doubleheader from the Air Force in Summerside. In the first game Joe Thistle clipped the wings of the Flyers with a brilliant three-hit effort for a 11-0 shutout. In pitching his shutout Thistle struck out three and walked none.

The Shamrocks scored once in the second inning, twice in the sixth on a combination of five walks and scored eight times in the seventh with the aid of two walks, two doubles, two base hits and two errors to send the Air Force down to defeat. Pete Sawatski, the losing pitcher gave up seven walks and two hits. Paul Dobson, who relieved him in the sixth gave up four walks and was touched for four hits including two doubles, one by Harold "Coker" Pineau and a pinch-hit double by Keith Dalziel. Wildness on the part of the Air Force hurlers contributed greatly to their downfall.

In the second game Keith Dalziel led the slab for the Shamrocks and came up with a creditable six-hit performance to beat the Air Force 7-5 in an abbreviated six inning game which was halted on account of a combination sand and rain storm. Dalziel in gaining his victory struck out one and walked five. Wildness again told the story for the Airmen when Dobson the starting hurler gave up ten walks and Sawatski, who relieved in the sixth, gave up two. Dobson was touched for only four hits but his control was lacking.

The Shamrocks scored once in the second, third and fourth innings and scored four times in the sixth inning on a combination of five walks and two errors. The big blow of the game for the Irish came in the top of the seventh inning when Joe Revel hit a triple off Pete Sawatski and later scored on a fielder's choice. The Air Force scored once in the second on a combination of three hits, once in the third and three times in the fourth inning with the help of a walk, a triple by Little and a home run off the bat of third baseman Davis.

## Ontario Wins Willingdon And Junior Golf Crown

TORONTO, (CP)—Ontario cleaned up on two golfing championships at stake Saturday when the four-man provincial team won the Willingdon Cup and 16-year-old Bobby Panasiuk of Wilfrid-Laurier grabbed the Canadian junior title by a single stroke.

It was a day of high winds, no pars and three disconcerting situations that had officials rushing into huddles and players turning red-faced.

The Ontario team, overcoming a four-stroke penalty to young Hugh Paterson and making the most of consistency, won inter-provincial team honors with a 36-hole medal score of 603.

British Columbia, closest contestant at any stage among the eight teams in action, faded in the afternoon after holding a two-stroke morning lead. Doug Bajus soared to an 80 after a morning 72.
