Every alternate Friday, steamer will go to Mount Stewart.

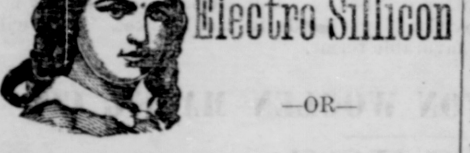
