Fishy Facts.

THE AMERICAN ANGLER.—We received to-day the first number of the first paper published in America in the interests solely of the anglers. It is interesting and will be welcomed by members of the craft.

A trout only a few weeks old will fight his weaker brethren, and generally vents his ire upon them by biting a piece out of their tails. Seth Green says that he has taken a trout one inch long out of another only two inches long.

The fungus growth, or rather disease found on many fish, but notably the salmon species, is said to be mostly caused by wounds or abrasures of the skin, which arise from accidental injuries or from the attacks of their natural enemies.

Drinking in the Civil Service.

The *Globe's* Ottawa Correspondent writes: "In view of the increase in drinking among members of the Civil Service to an extent that had impaired the efficiency of a number of clerks, an Order in Council of a very stringent character was some time since passed. Several suspensions, and at least one dismissal from office have taken place under the operation of the order, which it is intended, report says, to have rigidly enforced. The movement, if carried out without regard to the political leaning or the relationship of the offenders to Ministers, may have a decidedly wholesome effect; but it is, in the nature of things, difficult of impartial application."

Personal.

THE half a million pounds given nine years ago by the late George Peabody for the erection of model lodging-houses for the poor of London now amounts to £720,000.

The Montreal *Herald* employees have presented Mrs. Penny with a beautifully illuminated address expressive of their sorrow at the decease of her lamented husband.

Mr. WINDOM, who is about to retire from the Secretaryship of the Treasury of the United States, has made a splendid record for himself during his brief term of office. Since March 4th last he has redeemed \$105,636,750 of the public debt, and by the conversion of 5 and 6 per cent. bonds into 3½ per cents he has effected an annual saving of \$15,793,759 in the interest charge. It is true that the time was very opportune for funding the debt at a low rate of interest, and that the large surplus revenues of the Government make the office of Treasurer a comparatively pleasant one, but none the less Mr. Windom is deserving of praise for the business capacity and knowledge of financial questions which he has displayed.

SOME uneasiness prevails in London as to the health and safety of Mr. Gladstone. A gentleman who has just returned from Hawarden informs me that the Premier is still confined to his house by a chill and a sore throat he caught in the woods surrounding his castle for the purpose of ascertaining what damage the late gales had done to the trees. He did not rise to-day until past one. No one was admitted to the castle, and those approaching the castle were closely scanned by the policemen, of whom there are four on duty relays. The gentlemen met there the chief clerk of the police of the district, who said that the measure was a precautionary one, undertaken with the idea of deterring any attempt to molest Mr. Gladstone. Hawarden park has a placard at the entrance stating that it is "Free to visitors from sunrise to sunset," and the sombre hue of a policeman is strangely out of keeping in the beautiful pleasure-grounds of Hawarden, a typical English country gentleman's estate. It is a most unusual sight in England.

Religious News.

The Roman Catholic Church claims to have 400,000 converts in China. Protestant preaching is permitted in over 30,000 townships of France. The Mormon missionaries have recently gained 300 converts in Schleswig-Holstein.

There are in Syria 80 foreign preachers, 306 native helpers, 1,600 Christians, and 450,000 church-goers. The next general council of Presbyterian churches throughout the world will be held at Belfast in June, 1884. The committee of arrangements is already at work.

A Methodist lay college has been opened in Boston, to prepare young people for religious work. It is open to both sexes and all ages over ten, on condition of conformity to its rules. Instruction is given by lectures on the Bible, the church, Christian work, church music, English literature, etc., and is free.

Provincial meetings were held at different places in England during the sessions of the Methodist Ecumenical council. The one at Leeds considered the history of Methodism in that city and the means of securing co-operation among the various branches of the church and most widely to extend its influence and usefulness among all classes of the people.

Two weeks ago the last of the high celebrations in Holy Trinity Church, Toronto, took place, and henceforth the 7 o'clock celebration on Sunday with high ritual and vestments will be abolished. The rector, Rev. W. Stewart Darling, has retired, leaving the church in charge of the assistant rector. At the conclusion of the service last Sunday evening the organist and most of the members of the choir resigned.

Among the papers read at the Methodist Ecumenical Conference at London was one by the Rev. John Myers, a minister of the United Methodist Free Churches of Great Britain, which had for its title "The catholicity of Methodism"—a quality which many denominations have been claiming of late on very various grounds. The notes of catholicity which Mr. Myers attributed to his own branch of Christendom were, in the first place, that it made the area of its operations continuous with the inhabited world (ecumene), in obedience to John Wesley's own words, "The world is my parish." 2. Methodism's full and free offer of salvation to every human being, which she repeats after the Gospel, proves the same thing. 3. This catholicity was further evidenced in the method by which she admits persons to her fellowship. 4. So, too, by the equal rights assured in her communion to every convert. 5. Also by the equal obligation imposed on all to work in Christ's vineyard. 6. Her catholicity is further evident in her ecclesiastical arrangements. 7. Another proof was her having always endeavored to live at peace and to co-operate in Christian work with all other evangelical denominations, and with the Evangelical Alliance. The practical test of her catholicity was her success in the past, on which the essayist lovingly dwelt, and whence he augured her still more marvellous victories in the future.

The Lad and the Man.

As the boy begins, so will the man end. The lad who speaks with affectation, and mimes foreign tongues that he does not understand at school, will be a weak chameleon in character all his life; the boy who cheats his teachers into thinking him devout at chapel will be the man who will make religion a trade, and bring Christianity into contempt; and the boy who wins the highest average by stealing his examination papers will figure some day as a tricky politician. The lad who, whether rich or poor, dull or clever, looks you straight in the eyes and keeps his answer inside the truth already counts friends who will last all his life, and holds a capital which will bring him in a sure interest than money. Then get to the bottom of things. You see how it is already as to that. It was the student who was grounded in the grammar that took the Latin prize; it was that steady dredge who practised firing every day last winter that bagged the most game in the mountains; it is the clerk who studies the specialty of the house in off hours who is to be promoted. Your brilliant, happy-go-lucky, hit-or-miss fellow usually turns out the dead weight of the family by forty-five. Don't take anything for granted; get to the bottom of things. Neither be a sham yourself, nor be fooled by shams.—N. Y. Tribune.

The Kingston *News* says: "Reform writers make demands upon the credulity of their readers which can scarcely be satisfied unless, as the chief organ would say, they are willing to swallow anything, however 'idiotic.' A few days ago the organ asked on behalf of the 'astounded' people, and in the language of the vulgar boy, 'What are you giving us?' We are giving you sugar as cheap as it was, and cheaper than when it was refined by American labor; we are giving you tweeds as cheap and as good as could be had when the articles were imported from England; we are giving you coal on which the exporter pays the duty; we are giving workmen plenty of employment at high wages, and capitalists sufficient business to prevent the numerous disasters for which we a few years ago obtained an unpleasant notoriety; we are giving you a surplus of over \$4,000,000; an intercolonial which pays expenses, a C. P. R. which will cost the country nothing, and a tremendous traffic on all the railroads in Canada. We are giving you just what we promised prior to 1878, and what will guarantee you an extended sojourn on the cheerless shores of Opposition."

THE REGISTRAR'S BLUNDER.—An amusing incident happened on the opening of the Land Court in Dublin, on the 20th. When the judges entered and took their seats Mr. Smith, the Registrar of the Court arose with great solemnity and cried out: "I declare the Court of the Land League to be now opened," at which there was a burst of laughter, amid which the Registrar tried vainly to explain. He meant, of course, the Land Commission instead of the Land League.

The Paris *Star* thus answers the London *Advertiser*: "You say 'protection is wrong because it hampers trade and restricts individuals.' The rushing business the tradesmen and business men are doing belies your argument, brother."
