THE RECORD BROKEN.—At the Brooklyn Athletic Club grounds, a few days ago, M. W. Ford, the celebrated jumper, broke the record for five standing jumps, without weights. The best previous record was 55 feet 2 inches, made by H. M. Johnson, at St. Louis, Sept. 2, 1888. Ford cleared 56 feet 7 1/2 inches.

TROUT FISHING.—Messrs. Geo. E. Hughes, of the Apothecaries Hall, and John Binns, the well-known New Glasgow angler, visited Clifton yesterday, and made a big haul of splendid sea trout at the bridge. This is, it is said, the first catch of trout made at that place, which will likely be a favorite resort for anglers from this time out.

THE LOBSTER CATCH.—The Chignecto Post says: Lobster packing commenced this year much earlier than usual, and the fish are much more plentiful than they were last year. Mr. A. P. Lewis, manager of the Portland Packing Company's factory at Cape Tormentine, reports that the pack at that place on the first of June was nearly half as large as the total pack last year. Fishing did not commence last season till the 31st of May.

ANOTHER ADDRESS.—The address of the Executive Committee of the Y. M. C. A. to Rev. Mr. McLeod, was presented in the Parlor of the Association, by the President, yesterday afternoon. The address, for which we regret we have not space to-day, testified to the esteem in which the Rev. gentlemen and his amiable partner in life are held by the Association, and of the great regret felt at parting. Rev. Mr. McLeod's reply was appropriate to the occasion.

STRENGTH TESTER.—We were to-day shown an ingenious invention in the shape of a strength tester. The tester consists of an iron case about ten inches long and six inches high. On the top of the case is a scale and indicator to mark the strength of the pull, which is made by means of a handle at the end of the case. Before the tester will work, however, a cent has to be dropped into a slot at the side. The idea of dropping the cent in is that it overbalances a lever which checks the springs if not lowered. This machine is the property of Mr. John Burns, steward of the Heather Belle.

PUGILISTIC.—The toss for the choice of battle-ground for the Sullivan-Kilrain fight takes place at New York to-day. In case Sullivan wins the toss he will probably select Mississippi, where he fought Ryan in 1882. The fight will take place on Monday, July 8. Sullivan will wear a white waist and a white silk handkerchief, with a green border, in one corner will be a sunburst, in another a shamrock. The American flag will occupy the space in the third, and a harp will be pictured in the remaining corner. In the centre will be the pugilist's picture.

Billy Myers and Jack McAuliffe, the two rivals for the light-weight championship of the world, gave a sparring exhibition in Brooklyn, last night, the proceeds going to the relief of the Johnstown, Pa., sufferers.

THE HYERS SISTERS.—Speaking of a recent performance of the Hyers Sisters Comedy Co., which opens at the Lyceum on Friday next, the Halifax Chronicle says: The Hyers Sisters Comedy Company made their first appearance in the academy of music last night to a fair audience. The piece presented was the "great moral drama, 'Out of Bondage,' by Rev. Joseph Bradford, D. D., of Boston; a realistic picture of Southern life before and after the war." There is no plot in the piece, it evidently being designed entirely to give opportunity for the introduction of the solos, choruses and specialties, some twenty pieces in all being rendered. The singing was good, both in the solos and choruses, most of it to a marked degree. The performances by the Hyers sisters were much above the ordinary, both of them having highly cultivated voices, which they use to advantage. A second performance will be given to-night.

BIG BLAZE AT SEATTLE

Business Portion of the City Destroyed

WHAT THE LOSS WILL BE.

SEATTLE, W. T., June 7. The whole business portion of the city was destroyed by fire. It is estimated that the total loss by fire in buildings alone is about \$10,000,000. The personal losses will probably reach \$20,000,000. Giant powder was used to blow up buildings in the hope of staying the progress of the flames, but to no effect. It is reported two men were lynched for stealing. The city is under martial law, guarded by three military companies and a special committee of 200 citizens. About 100 thieves were arrested. There were very few casualties. There are authentic reports for only two deaths; victims names unknown.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7. Late despatches from Seattle state that the loss from fire yesterday will not fall short of \$10,000,000. The estimated total insurance reaches from \$1,500,000 to \$4,000,000. Already in many places workmen have begun to grade and clean up the lots preparatory to building.

A Budget From Ottawa.

OTTAWA, June 7. The appointment of Edward Murphy to the Senate will be gazetted to-morrow. The net debt of Canada decreased \$57,000 during the past month. The revenue for the eleven months ending June 1st was \$34,250,000, and the expenditure \$29,500,000.

Hon. Mr. Tupper has issued circulars to all Dominion representatives and newspaper editors in the Maritime Provinces, requesting their opinions as to the best mode of distributing the fishery bounty. A Canadian Pacific official now there, reports that the rush of business by the Short Line to St. John is far beyond their anticipations, and that their "500" Line is demoralizing freight rates from the American north-west to the seaboard.

Another Suicide.

HALIFAX, June 7. William Lucas, an old soldier and convict, hung himself to-day. He was the son of a wealthy contractor in Brighton, England, who frequently urged him to return home and be forgiven. Instead, he became a confirmed drunkard.

Sailor Drowned.

HALIFAX, June 7. The steamer Portia from Halifax, for St. John's, Nfld., undertook to take in tow the disabled steamer Panther, a big wave upset the boat in which the Portia's men were endeavoring to attach the hawser and Noah Clarke was drowned.

Chignecto Ship Railway.

HALIFAX, June 7. Work is being rapidly pushed on the Chignecto Ship Railway, on some sections by night and day. Two thousand men are still required. High wages are offered.

Three Days in a Dory

HALIFAX, June 7. Peter Peterson and Albert P. Stramberg have arrived at North Sydney after being three days in a dory without food.

Mr. Stavert, during his brief stay in Moncton, has made many friends among the business people of the town and his removal will be regretted. The Moncton Times says: Mr. R. J. Patton, a somewhat famous railway man from Harford, Conn., is in town. Mr. Patton is the inventor of a patent torpedo holder and is canvassing for it in Canada. He says he sold 100 to the P. E. I. railway, but the authorities here did not seem to fall in love with his patent, and he will leave to-day.

For upwards of twenty years past, says an exchange, the accomplished editor of the Amerist Gazette and Record has been giving his services gratuitously to the Baptist church as choir director and organist. A few evenings ago the subject was introduced by the pastor, and it was resolved that Mr. Black be offered a salary of two hundred and fifty dollars per year. Mr. Black will probably give up the newspaper business on receipt of his first quarter's salary. A man who can earn a quarter of a thousand a year running a church choir is wasting his time in the newspaper business.
