

# Massey Requests Scholarship Fund

Mr. Massey urged Canadians to maintain links with the "living past" through better identification and preservation of national monuments. Anniversaries should also be cherished. Enthusiasm should not recede with the day; "something permanent should survive," such as a community hall, park, sports ground or restored historic buildings.

The governor-general suggested that a little Canadian "nationalism in a benevolent form" is not dangerous thing.

A Canada without Scotsmen would be dull indeed. Scotsmen derived their special quality partly from profound pride in the little country that gave their birth.

"It seems to me that the kind of nationalism I have just described is the kind that belongs to us in Canada—the pride and confidence in ourselves that can give us driving form and direction, both internally and externally, the capacity to achieve great things at home and in influence events abroad."

The governor-general's remarks were included in a text of a speech issued to the press before delivery.

# Decline Seen In Newsprint

NEW YORK (AP)—The Canadian newsprint industry is expected to operate in 1959 at a slightly lower percentage of capacity than in 1958, the newsprint information committee estimated Wednesday.

The committee's publication, Newsprint Facts, said that the drop from slightly more than 84 per cent in 1958 to about 82 per cent is mainly due to increased production facilities.

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# Captain W. Eric Warburton Dies In British Columbia

Former friends of Capt. W. Eric Warburton, son of Dr. James Warburton for several years Mayor and member of the Legislative Assembly for Charlottetown, will regret to hear of his death recently at Richmond, British Columbia, in his 66th year.

Eric, the second son of Doctor and Mrs. Warburton, was born and received his early education in Charlottetown attending West Kent School and Prince of Wales College. Later he went to Kings College, Windsor, N.S., and to McGill for a course in engineering.

In 1914 he enlisted in an engineer unit of the Royal Navy serving in England and Gallipoli. In Gallipoli he was badly wounded and awarded the D.C.M. Invalided to England he was commissioned there but was not able to serve abroad again.

On return to Canada in 1919 he settled in British Columbia and was for a time city engineer at Penitence where he did some notable work in flood control.

In the Second World War he served as captain with the Royal Canadian Engineers where his duties included the tracing and destruction of balloon bombs incendiary bombs launched by the Japanese. In this service he was wounded in the hand.

Captain Warburton was a member of the Professional Engineers of British Columbia and of the Canadian Legion. Twice married he is survived by his widow the former Alla Bardal of Winnipeg, a sister Helen, wife of Alfred Blackmore of Cobourg, Ontario, and J. Arthur Warburton of Hual, Quebec.
