

American Peggy Fleming Stunningly Upsets Burka

DAVOS, Switzerland (CP-AP)—Bronze-haired Peggy Fleming of the United States, a prima ballerina on ice, won the world skating title for women Sunday. In a stunning upset, defending champion Petra Burka of Toronto finished third.

Gabriele Seyfert of East Germany grabbed the silver medal, moving ahead of Miss Burka in the final free-skating competition. Experts here said it was the first time in figure skating history that a world champion had placed as low as third in trying to defend the title.

The bronze medal won by the Dutch-born Miss Burka was the only award won this year by Canadians, who last year picked up a gold and a bronze and have made generally strong showing in world competition since the 1948 Olympic and

world victories of Barbara Ann Scott of Ottawa. Valerie Jones, 17-year-old Toronto girl who has been runner-up to Miss Burka in Canadian competition the last two years, placed fourth. Roberta Laurent, 17, also of Toronto, was 15th.

WAS UPSET

Miss Burka, coached by her mother, Ellen Danby Burka, a former Dutch champion, appeared somewhat upset after the first two compulsory figures were skated Friday, with Miss Fleming piling up a lead which she added to in each succeeding stage.

Mrs. Burka said the open-air Davos rink handicapped the Canadian champion. "It's this open-air rink and the unusually hard ice," said Mrs. Burka. "She would need a month to get accustomed to the ice. She would need a different grind on her blades, too."

The Canadian champion also was reported suffering from the effects of losing 35 pounds by dieting in recent months.

The U.S. winner, from Colorado Springs, Colo., said the sun was so bright that it bothered her eyes during the competition, but that everything turned out well for her.

"I did my whole program and it worked out wonderfully," she said.

Mrs. Herta Waechter, famous Austrian trainer, said: "She deserved the title. She is a real prima ballerina on the ice."

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP)—Wayne Matheson of Summerside, P.E.I., skipped Acadia University to its second consecutive Maritime Intercollegiate curling championship here during the weekend, defeating Paul Pergeau's Mount Allison University foursome 10-4 in the final.

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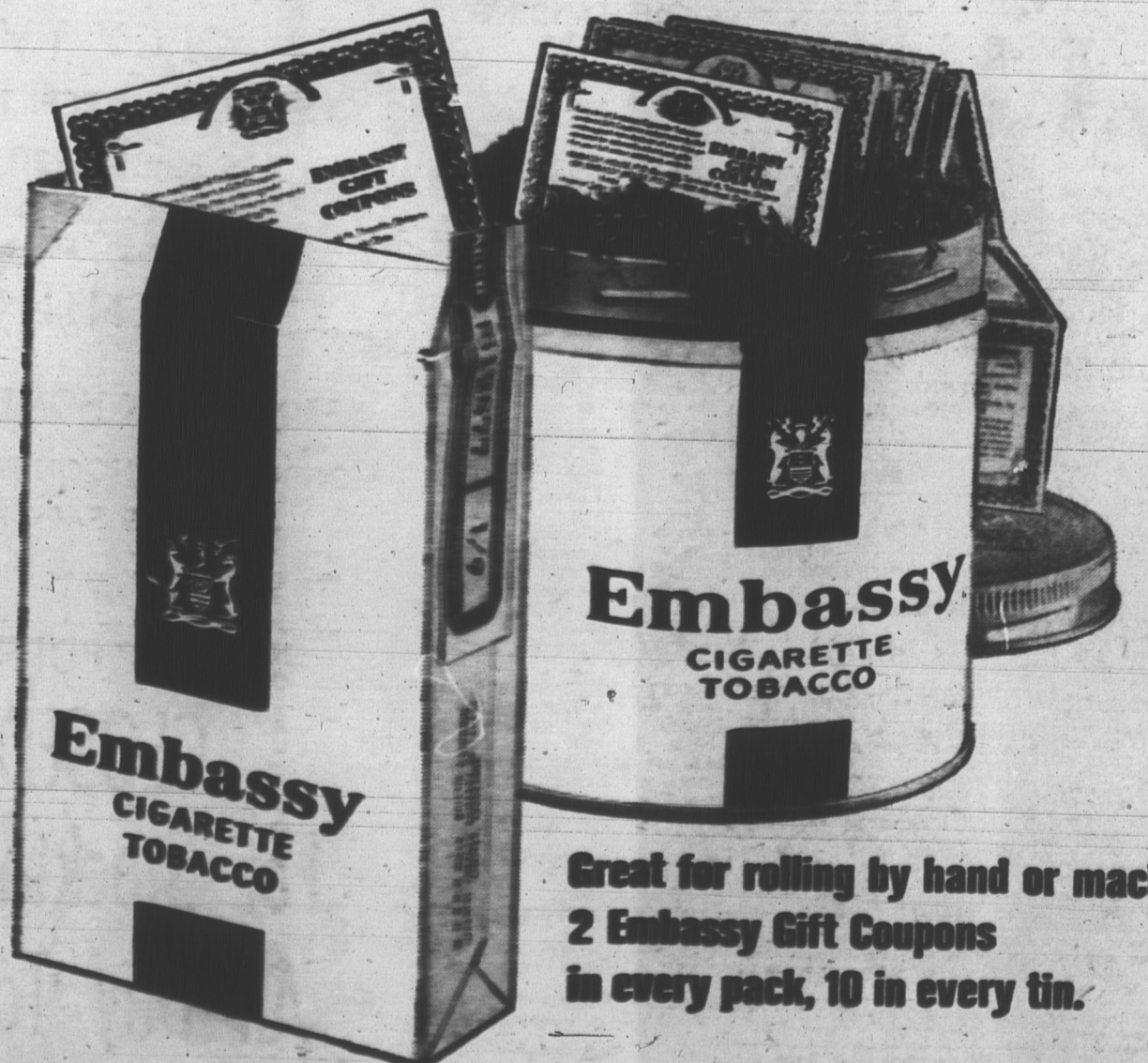
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
