

LIBRARY SERVICES TO BE EXTENDED

Dr. Kenneth A. Parker, superintendent of city schools, yesterday morning announced that the library services in all city schools will undergo a big expansion for this coming school year, which gets underway Sept. 4.

He remarked on the observations made by several members of the Canadian Library Association who called here this summer.

Following a visit to the various school libraries, particularly those at Birchwood and Queen Charlotte High Schools, they declared "Charlottetown has the best growing school library system to be found in any city or town of comparable size, and even among many larger communities."

For the first time in history, all seven schools throughout town will be provided with the services of either a full or part-time librarian.

"The establishment and use of such libraries is a major step in the academic tone of all schools, and their function cannot be overlooked in the field of education," Dr. Parker said.

"The full value of a school library depends largely on the number and range of books that are available for distribution to the teachers and students" he said.

Speaking of the library organization in Charlottetown schools, Dr. Parker stated that both Birchwood and Queen Charlotte have full-time librarians, Mr. Taylor at the former and Miss Jessie Fullerton at the latter.

These full-time services include the contents of each library is fully catalogued and permits for each class to have at least one library period each week.

In the five elementary schools Dr. Parker revealed that each library will be serviced by a teacher - Librarian, already in the school board.

Miss Bessie Prowse will occupy the post at West Kent; Miss Jessie Fullerton at Prince Street; Mrs. Esther Petch at Spring Park; and Sister St. Reginald Marie at Queen Charlotte.

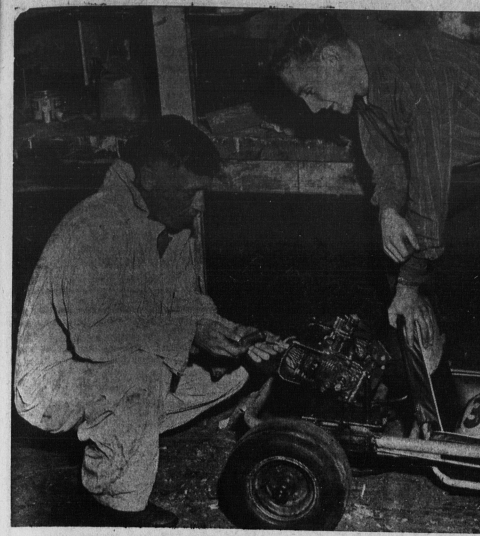

Complete Physical Ed. Plan Introduced For City Schools

A new system which will have children in grades one to six taking part in a complete physical education program will be introduced now that the new city elementary schools are nearing completion. Dr. K.A. Parker said yesterday.

In this connection, Allan Andrews, Kensington, has been appointed director of physical education for all elementary schools. In his duties, Mr. Andrews will divide his schedule between St. Jean, West Kent, Prince Street, Rochford Square and Spring Park Schools.

WILL BE SUPPLEMENTED

"At each of these schools, in turn, he will give demonstrations of physical training exercises and games. During the periods that he will be occupied at one of the other schools, the physical education program will be supplemented by instruction given by the classroom teachers to the first year individual classes.

In this field, Dr. Parker revealed that it has become evident that physical education at Birchwood High and Queen Charlotte High was in need of expansion, and that the work was becoming too heavy for one instructor at each school.

This year, the PT staff at both schools is being augmented by the introduction, for the first time in Prince Edward Island, of female physical training instructors.

Miss Anne Murraghan has been appointed, while Mrs. Joan Starns has been named for similar duties at Queen Charlotte.

PRIMARY DUTIES

Their primary duties will be the giving of physical training instruction to the girl students, and the supervision of the male class instructors, Jack Kane at Birchwood, and Jack Dwyer at Queen Charlotte.

Mr. Parker noted that today in order to obtain excellent academic standards, physical education and other services of a like nature are an essential part of the education of a child. It is the best possible type of physical education that should be given to our youth.

The full introduction of physical education in all our city schools, we will be trying to provide the best possible school environment and also attain a higher standard of academic achievement."

Guidance Plan To Be Introduced

With the appointment of Michael Hennessy, B.A., BEd, Birchwood High School will be the first school in Prince Edward Island to provide a full-time guidance program, Dr. K. A. Parker, superintendent of city schools said yesterday.

Mr. Hennessy, who for the past three years has been employed by the department of education as a teacher for the deaf, in preparation for his new duties with the city school board recently underwent a course of professional studies in the field of guidance counselling at the Ontario College of Education in Toronto.

In giving the remand, the magistrate ordered the accused to make restitution for the damages in the amount of \$6 by the time he is brought back to court Friday morning.

On the charge of driving while intoxicated, William I. Giddings, Charlottetown, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to seven days in Queens County jail.
