This case was tried before Judge Hazzard and jury last June, when judgment was given for plaintiff for \$230.30.

Guards With Orders To Shoot to Kill

CHICAGO, May 18—Death threats sent to police officials, the announcement that three labor leaders would have to stay in jail, and steps to place armed guards about every building under construction in Chicago were developments today in the police war on labor terrorists.

The placing of guards with orders to "shoot to kill" about building projects followed a fire started by bombers last night as the latest act of violence in a campaign against the Landis wage award.

"Big Tim" Murphy, Fred Mader, President of the Building Trades Council and "Don" Shea were checked at the outset of a supposed move for freedom today when Chief Justice Kinchham in Schanlan of the criminal court rejected a defense motion for assignment and immediate hearing of their trial on charges of having slain a patrolman.

The death threats were received by chief of police Charles Fitzmorris and Captain Wesley Westbrook told members of the Lions Club that "the respectable element in the labor unions of Chicago must repudiate their criminal leaders or lose the support of those who are in favor of the union cause."

Provincial Legislature

Continued From Page 1

A proclamation has been passed bringing this into force. Last year the Dominion Act was amended, and it is simply to bring our Act into conformity with the Dominion Act that this change is made. It is the law, anyway, by virtue of the proclamation, because the Dominion Act overrides any provincial statute.

The bill passed without amendment. At 5.10 the House went into committee on the Election Act with Mr. McArthur in the chair. Clauses 172 to 248 were adopted with little discussion. At 6 o'clock the House took recess.

Evening Session, May 2.

The House met after recess at 9.15 p.m., and resumed in committee second reading of the Election Act.

Section 24 provided that the Assembly should appoint the Legislative clerk and assistant clerks. Premier Bell moved that this be changed in order to provide for the clerk's appointment by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. The change, he said, was simply to make the statute consistent with the practice. It was necessary for the governor-in-council to make the appointment because if that was not done, and done before the House met, the House could only make the appointment after the opening, and that would be too late. The clerk would then have no opportunity of getting things ready, so that it is almost a matter of necessity that some authority should appoint him beforehand.

Mr. D. C. McDonald did not see why the appointment should not be made by the Legislature, as laid down in the Act.

Hon. Mr. Johnston: I agree with the view taken by the hon. member from Souris. This is a matter that applies to the internal management of the House. The Speaker and the other officials are appointed by the Legislature, and it is always understood that they will be appointed in advance. There is no such thing, under the constitution, as any particular party in the House—the members are simply representatives of the people. It is true there is a Prime Minister and Executive Council in connection therewith, but as to the alignment, in theory, it is not supposed to be known by the members stand until they actually meet on the floor of the House. Therefore, it is entirely a matter of House-keeping. The clerk of the Legislature is appointed by the Legislature itself. He is the servant of the House, and not of the government. Though it is understood in advance that the party in power has selected that official, still it would be out of all the practice and theory of the conduct of the House to suggest that in advance the governor-in-council should appoint him.

Mr. Dennis: Is it possible to open the Legislature without a clerk? I understand that it is not. Let us suppose that such an unfortunate thing would occur as another party having authority to select him—it

Mr. Higgs: The Attorney-General has explained the theory—I am going to deal with the practice. It has always been the practice in the past that the governor-in-council agree practically in the appointment of all these officials. Why not get down to business and handle it in a practical manner, and allow him to be appointed by the governor-in-council? It is done anyway. Hon. Mr. Johnston: If my hon. friend would just glance back to the past few months—a new government came in at Ottawa and what was the first thing they did? Before the governor's speech was read in the House the members met and selected their Speaker and officials—before the message was presented at all. That is what we do here—we select our Speaker before the Governor ever comes into the House to present his address. That is the theory and that is the idea that prevails. The member for Charlottetown said the officials are selected by the governor-in-council. Then why did my hon. friend arise and move a few days ago that such a person be appointed messenger or door-keeper if that is the case? He did so because these officials, like the Speaker and the Clerk, are servants of the House and not of the Government. Mr. Speaker Duffy: My hon. friend's reference to the practice at Ottawa with regard to the Speaker is right, but the rule does not apply to the Clerk there. He is appointed by the Crown. It is more convenient to have him appointed by the governor-in-council so that once he is appointed he will be able to have everything ready for the opening of the House. It is one of the biggest jobs in his whole year's work, and he must get time to do it. That is the reason why the Act was changed at Ottawa and it is to make it conform with the present law and the present practice that we are amending the provincial Act. Hon. Mr. Johnston: The hon. gentleman admits that I am correct with regard to the Speaker. If he is the servant of the House why he the servant, too? He admits that in theory I am right. But why does he say that the clerk or any particular person must prepare the preliminaries? The clerk is appointed to carry out the preliminaries, but anybody may prepare them. It is said that the clerk should be fixed upon in advance. That is the very argument I make. The government in power will naturally select that man in advance just the same as they select the Speaker. It is embodied in the statutes that the members shall appoint the Clerk. That has always been the law and the practice until some few years ago when they amended the immemorial practice of the House. It is also the practice elsewhere. Hon. Mr. Hughes: I think we are wasting time over this. It has always been considered that the clerk will be appointed by the governor-in-council, and I think it will be. The clause goes on to say that his appointment will be confirmed by the Assembly. That is all right, isn't it? Mr. Speaker Duffy's amendment was put to a vote and carried.
