Local and Other Items

A FOWL PROCEEDING.—A Yarmouth man lately set a hen on fourteen eggs and six chickens resulted. The energetic fowl had laid a couple more eggs just to show her capacity and hatched the lot.

A STRANGE CASE.—A venerable lady of 70 years is a sufferer from scarlet fever at her home in Barriefield, across the river from Kingston, N. B. Medical men say it is the first case they have known of so old a lady been attacked with a juvenile disease.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The fourth quarterly meeting of the District Division will take place in North River hall with North River Loyal Division on Thursday the 22nd day of June at 2 p. m. Public meeting and entertainment to be held in the evening. As many delegates as possible will be expected to be present.

DISTILLER HELPS THE CHURCH.—At a recent meeting of the Prescott, Ont., Presbytery the offer of Mr. J. P. Wiser, the well known distiller, to pay off half the indebtedness of the Presbyterian Church, amounting to something over two thousand dollars, has been accepted, the congregation promising to make up the balance within two weeks.

HARVARD PROGRESSING. Harvard is to have a College of Comparative Medicine along the lines of the Jenner Institute of London, the Pasteur Institute of Paris, and the Institute of Hygiene of Berlin. The liberal bequests of the late Henry L. Pierce have made this possible, and a most thoroughly equipped school will be the result. The American papers are already claiming that it will be the greatest college of its class in the world.

CAN'T WAKE THE GIRL.—Advices from Philadelphia state that physicians at the German hospital and medical men outside the institution are puzzled over the strange case of nineteen year-old Viola M. Brown, who, having determined to commit suicide on Friday last, inhaled illuminating gas. She was found unconscious, and though every means known to medical science has been tried to bring her to her senses, she still lies as if dead, not a muscle moving, only the faint heart and pulse being noticeable. Gas has never before been known to produce similar symptoms.

HE PINES FOR FREEDOM.—According to a Columbus, Ind., despatch George Wray who is 102 years of age, desires a divorce from his wife Susan, who is only 35 years of age. The case is watched with unusual interest. Mr. Wray, who was born in Londonderry, Ireland, May 1, 1797, has been married three times. He has had twelve children in all—six by his first wife of whom three are living; three by his second two of whom are living, and three by his last wife, all of whom are living. He and his wife have been living apart since 1886.

WHEN CARE WAS NECESSARY.—An English judge travelling in the United States finding himself short of cash, presented one of the druggists he had at a local bank, but was told he must be loaned by some one. 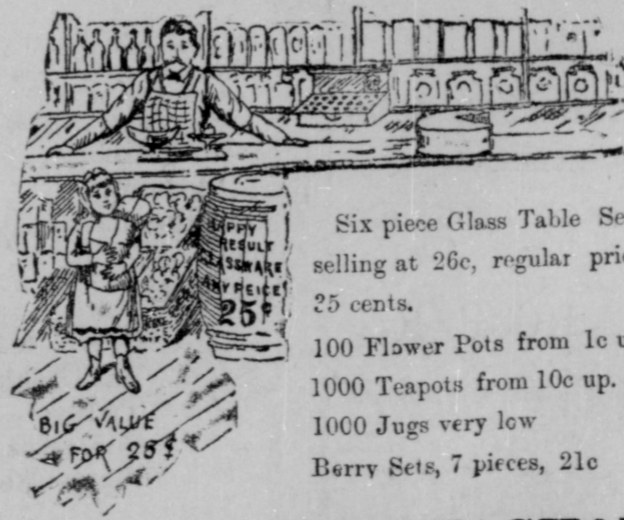
