THE HALIFAX ELECTION.—Mr. Donald Archibald has been nominated by the Reformers of Halifax to contest the seat for that constituency against Mr. Stairs. Mr. Archibald has already been tried and found wanting. It is not likely that he will be tried again.

It is estimated by an authority on such matters that 128,000,000 bushels wheat will be required from abroad by Great Britain, while the state of the peas and rye crop as well as potatoes will leave the growers of them about four millions of pounds sterling out of pocket.

The Local Government has appointed Mr. Alfred McWilliams of West Cape, Lot 7, to be a Justice of the Peace for Prince County; and also to be a Commissioner for taking Acknowledgements to Deed for Prince County. The judgment pronounced by the Canadian Supreme Court in the Nova Scotia Great Seal case, or rather Queen's Council case, has created a flutter of excitement in legal circles throughout Canada. In Toronto, Ottawa and other cities, the decision has had a disrobing effect. Lawyers practising in the Supreme Court at Ottawa, who had been appointed Queen's Counsel by Provincial Governments, bowed at once to the inevitable and laid aside their silk gowns. Their brethren in Toronto and other Ontario cities, similarly situated, are also doing their robes.

The mail couriers between this city, Vernon River and Wood Islands are not performing their contracts satisfactorily; and the *Argus*, in a lengthy article, complains of their irregularities. Hitherto the mails between Charlottetown, Vernon River and Wood Islands were carried with the greatest satisfaction to the people of the places named. Why cannot the present drivers give the same satisfaction? Up to the present we have had no roads to prevent timely communication with the southern sections of the county; and we are at a loss to account for the present irregularities. We hope the postal authorities will take proper steps to have the mails delivered on time.

A P. E. ISLANDER SWINDLED IN BOSTON.—The Boston *Globe* of the 7th inst., contains the following: "William P. Bradshaw is the name of a man who belongs to Charlottetown, P. E. I. He came to Boston yesterday, having plenty of money, and during the day he met a fellow named Joseph F. Allison. The latter seemed to be an honest, good-natured party, and, above all, he was highly entertaining. A friendship soon sprang up between the two, and they were as happy as two brothers. During the afternoon, at the North End, Allison had to pay a bill, and not having the money, Bradshaw kindly loaned him six sovereigns. Allison went off to pay the bill but it is supposed that he could not find the party to whom he owed the money, as he has not yet returned to Mr. Bradshaw."

Much loss of property has been caused by the tide carrying off fish-houses, stages, boats, fishing gear, etc., at Rustico. The *Argus*' correspondent says:—"The fishing establishment of Mr. Edward Woolner, together with his boats, was completely destroyed; loss \$500. Mr. Thomas Doyle and Mr. James Cousins, whose stages were swept away, are losers to the extent of \$1,000. W. H. McNeill's fishing stage and boats were badly damaged; his loss will amount to \$700. The fishing establishment occupied by H. Fairclough was washed off the block, the greater part of its contents being carried away. His loss is about \$600. Mr. Newson's wharf at "Sea Side Hotel" was damaged; most of the clay is washed off, together with the Bathing House. The amount of the loss to Mr. Newson is not yet ascertained.
