SUMMARY

CURRENCIES

MONTREAL (CP)—The U.S. dollar in terms of Canadian funds was unchanged at \$1.07 7/16 pound sterling was down 1/4 at \$3.01 1/4.

NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market climbed to another new high Thursday as the fast-moving electronics and other glamour issues came back into favor.

Trading was heavy with \$200,000 shares changing hands compared with 7,529,000 Wednesday.

The day's volume put the total for the year to date to 1,249,000,000 shares compared with 1,236,000,000 all of last year, said the New York Stock Exchange.

The Dow Jones industrial average ended the day with a gain of 72 at 961.85, bettering Wednesday's record high. The average, however, was up as much as 4.23 in early afternoon.

Several blue chips weakened considerably in late trading as the more volatile issues came to the fore. Of 1,411 issues traded, 621 rose and 523 fell.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose 1.0 to a new high of 358.8 with industrials up .6, rails up 1.2 to a high for the year and utilities up .5.

Standard 500-stock index rose .15 to 92.46. In early dealings it was ahead of its most recent closing high but it faded toward the end.

Ten of the 15 most active stocks advanced, three declined and two were unchanged.

Pan American World Airways, spearheading an airline group which stepped ahead vigorously, was the most active stock, up 1/2 at 40 on 155,400 shares, making it the most active stock.

Autos backed away from early gains. General Motors sank 1/2 to close at 106.54. As other market wheelers backedtracked, Anaconda rose 1/4 to 2 1/2, Kennecott 1/8, Union Carbide 5/8, General Electric 3/4 and U.S. Steel 1/4.

Among color TV issues, Radio Corp. rose 1/2, Zenith 4/8, Magnavox 2/8, Motorola 4/8 and Admiral 2/8.

Aluminium Ltd. rose 1/8 among Canadian issues traded while Walker Goodenham was up 3/4, Canadian Pacific and Dome Mines each fell 1/4. International Nickel was down 1/4.

Prices were irregularly higher on the American exchange. Volume was 3,580,000 compared with 3,830,000 Wednesday. Brazilian Tractations fell 1/4 while 1/4 losses were taken by Canadian Marconi, Canadian Javelin and Scurry Rainbow Oil.
