THE GRITS LEFT AGAIN

Langelier's Bogus Affidavit.

Robitaille's Dealings Were Honest.

OTTAWA, Aug. 29. In the Senate Railway Committee yesterday, the counter charges made by Langelier on behalf of the Quebec Government against Senator Robitaille and other prominent Conservatives for the misappropriation of the Bay Chaleur railway subsidies, were investigated.

Langelier had charged them before the Committee with embezzlement, and produced in support of the charges an affidavit from one Taylor, railway contractor, that \$118,000 of railway subsidies had so been embezzled.

Yesterday Taylor testified that the affidavit was bogus and he had never sworn to it, that the charges contained in it were false and that it was merely a fake document prepared by Langelier's brothers with the intention of helping the Hon. Mr. McFarlane to raise some money.

Taylor further stated that Robitaille's dealings with contractors had been strictly honest, and he had paid them every cent.

Premier Mercier's Explanation

Sorry Pacaud Skipped Out.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)

HALIFAX, Aug. 28.—Quebec—Good catches of cod are being made at Long Point, Thunder River and St. John's River and fair at Sheldrake, Maggie and Grand River, while only a few are being taken at Newport Point.

New Brunswick—The fishing throughout this district is very dull, except at Point Escuminac, where mackerel are reported very plentiful.

P. E. I.—Fair catches of mackerel are being made at Miminigash, and fair fishing at Big Miminigash. Good catches of mackerel and fair hauls of cod and haddock at Malpeque.

Cape Breton—All branches of the fishing industry are very dull, the only catches reported to-night being a few mackerel and cod. Squid at St. Ann's, and one quintal of cod per boat at Louisburg.

Nova Scotia—Shore fishing good, but mackerel and herring scarce at Lunenburg. Dogfish destroying the fishermen's nets and preventing codfishing at Liverpool, are the only reports received.

Bait, herring bait by fishermen's nets reported at Liverpool. Fair quantities of squid taken at Grand River and Newport Point, Que., and some small ones gilled to-day at Louisburg.
