Be it resolved that the Public Health Department, Sanitary Engineering Division be requested to take over the inspection of all restaurants, hotels, catering and any other public eating establishments that are, or may be, operating in the City of Charlottetown.

That the City Council heartily endorse the Tuberculin Testing Survey which is to be carried on in our City, by the Prince Edward Island Department of Health co-operating with the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League, starting in January.

Ch'town Native Dies In Arizona; Was Active Montreal Broker

Mr. Alex H. MacKinnon, a native of Charlottetown and prominent Montreal stockbroker, died Tuesday in Tucson, Arizona where he had gone for his health to spend the winter months. He was a partner of L.F. Roehrich, New York City. Mr. MacKinnon was 60 years old.

The late Mr. MacKinnon was the son of the late J.J. MacDonnald and Mrs. MacKinnon of Charlottetown. He was a student at King's Collegiate College, Windsor, N.S.

At the outbreak of World War I he enlisted with the Artillery and served overseas. After the war he entered McGill University from which he graduated with his Commerce degree. For a time he was employed with the Brompton Pulp and Paper Company of East Angus, Quebec.

Delightful Program By Four Star Concert Artists In City

Standing-in for Miss Elizabeth Devlin, who was unable to make this trip due to illness, was Miss Lorraine Moreau, a promising young French soprano.

For her first selection, Miss Moreau sang a heart-warming rendition of the ever-popular, "Kerry Dancers" followed by "One Fine Day" from "Madame Butterfly". A true Guarnerius violin played

by a true master, delighted the ear of all. Mr. Francis Flanagan, who studied under the immortal Fritz Kreisler, delighted the audience with a number of selections written by that great violinist.

Following a period of intermission the artists returned with more of their beautiful music and song. Mr. Turel played two of his own compositions, "The Brook, and "The Clown", followed by Liszt's "Second Hungarian Rhapsody".

Mr. Flanagan kept his hearers spellbound with "Allergo" by Puccini and "Ave Maria" by Schubert-Wilhelm and his own interpretation of "Danny Boy". Mr. Swails' very fine tenor was heard in "La donna e mobile" from Regatta by Verdi; "Still as the Night" by Bohm; and "The Lord is My Light" by Allitsen.

The finale comprised a medley from "The Merry Widow" sung by Miss Moreau and Mr. Swails, accompanied by Mr. Turel and Mr. Flanagan.

The concert closed with "The Queen."

Precautionary Measures Taken At P.E.I. Hospital

The Board of Trustees of the P.E.I. Hospital announces a change of policy. In the past year or more hospitals across Canada and the United States have been encountering an increase in the number of skin infections in hospital patients, staff and new hospital admissions.

This problem has been brought to the attention of the Board during the past few months. A method of control is to be instituted which necessitates changes in staff techniques and methods, and both the Board and Medical staff approve these special precautions.

This season is a relatively slack period of hospital admissions and is felt to be the opportune time to institute such major changes. There will be a short period which warrants a curtailment of the use of certain hospital areas and hospital functions, and inconveniences are anticipated to both patients and staff during this change period.
