



Guardian Patriot Join Wirephoto Network

The Evening Patriot and The Guardian joined Canadian Press wirephoto network service yesterday providing access to world-wide news photos in a matter of minutes.

The service will give the newspapers' readers the most up-to-the-minute pictures possible of world events as they happen.

The new Atlantic wirephoto network joins five cities in three Maritime provinces and a Canada service that now delivers pictures to 45 daily newspapers in eight provinces.

The day-and-night Atlantic network will serve newspapers in Saint John, Moncton, Charlottetown, Halifax and Sydney. It marks the first time that photos have been sent to the Maritimes by wire on a regular daily basis.

Transmission will be direct from Toronto with selection aimed specifically at Maritime interests. The network, which the Atlantic Network can be split directly to the main CP or Maritime Press network. Immediate transmission of pictures on any outstanding news breaks.

A native Maritimer is in charge of CP Picture Service at the Toronto head office. A Canadian Press, the national news co-operative.

Irving H. Newell, CP's chief of picture service, started in newspaper work with the Halifax Herald. He worked for CP in Halifax and Saint John before being transferred to Toronto in 1955. He has been with CP since 1957.

Growth of wirephoto service in Canada has been rapid in recent years.

The CP network was established in Ontario and Quebec in 1955. It has since been extended as far as Winnipeg May 1, 1961. Six months later the Northwest Network was expanded across Saskatchewan and Alberta, the first time network service had been provided across the Prairies.

Heart Attack Cause of Death Says Jury

ALBERTON (BUREAU REPORT) — A coroner's jury, empaneled by Dr. C. M. Dewar to inquire into the death of Louis Sorden Ellis of Springfield West, heard evidence of a severe heart attack which was the cause of death last night and brought in their verdict that death occurred due to a heart attack.

The first witness, Capt. R. W. Borden, told of going to Springfield West on Thursday, Dec. 6, where he found the body of Mr. Ellis in his truck. There were no marks of violence on the body which was taken to the P.E.I. Hospital for post mortem.

The next witness, Dr. C. W. Hayden of O'Leary said he went to the scene at 6:45 a.m. and pronounced the man dead. He saw no visible marks but there was some blood from the nose about 100 feet from the truck.

Lloyd Foley, Springfield West, said the deceased came to his place on the afternoon of Dec. 5, and they went to Summerside where they got some groceries and two pints of whisky. On Dec. 6, he took Mr. Ellis to drink the whisky and went to Ellis' place to feed his animals. When they returned to his home he left Ellis in his truck and went into the house.

Thursday at daylight, he said he went to the truck and opened the door and called to Ellis who was lying on the seat in the rear position. Receiving no reply he returned home and went to bed. When he awoke he remembered he again went out and looked in and Ellis was still there.

On Friday morning he went to the truck and found that Ellis had been in the truck since 10:30 and found Foley and a doctor. Witness said he didn't know how long he had been in the truck but he would come into his house and make a mess.

On Saturday morning, Dr. Hayden, who had been called to Summerside, said that Ellis and Foley were at his home early on the evening of Dec. 6, and they were drinking but not intoxicated. He saw some liquor and a glass of whisky on the table.

Oscar O'Holloran, Gleggary, stated that Ellis and Foley called on him on Saturday morning at 8:45 to St. Dunstan's Basilica for a requiem Mass at 9 o'clock. The funeral service started at 10:30 a.m. and the interment was in the Roman Catholic cemetery.

Beef Cattle Prices Made

A comparison between prices offered for beef cattle here and in several other Canadian centers is made by Daniel Gass, president of the P.E.I. Beef Producers Association.

Mr. Gass who is "using only quotations for Blue Brand cattle, in order not to impose too much on those," says: "According to the price formula agreement with Canada Packers, the week ending Dec. 28, the price of Blue Brand steer carcasses was \$43. If the dressing percentage would be 55, then that price would equal \$25.60 on a live weight basis."

"The Livestock and Meat Trade Board of actual sales for the week ending Dec. 28, of Blue Brand steers at Winnipeg, show \$26.00 average, compared with average \$27.12 and \$27.25, Montreal and Toronto centers 49.1."

Poultry Industry's Need Sad Marketing Agency

Members of the P.E.I. Agricultural Association at their annual dinner Thursday at Birch Court Experimental Farm were of the opinion that if the poultry industry in the province is to progress, it is almost essential that a marketing agency be set up to handle and sell their products.

About 55 persons attended the dinner which was presided over by association president J.D. MacRae and Deputy Minister S.C. Wright.

It was noted that although the association has fewer members this year, production is staying at about the same level.

Yogi Berra To Continue As Player

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Yankee outfielder said Friday that Yogi Berra, the team's veteran catcher, would continue as an active player next season but may take on the added duties of a coach.

"It is fairly certain Yogi eventually will become a coach with the Yankees," said Bob Fishel, the Yankees' publicity chief. "And it could well be that it could happen this year. However, no official decision has been made and none will be made until next week, at the earliest."

Fishel's statement came in answer to a report in the New York Star-Ledger that Berra would become a player-coach.

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Four Satellites Are Planned In Canadian Space Program

OTTAWA (CP) — A Canadian space program including the launching of four more earth satellites is planned for 1964-68, it was learned Friday.

The program here, which has approval of the United States government, is expected to be responsible for launching of the satellites as in the case of the commercial satellite system known as Project Aretus.

The satellite program, estimated to cost some \$6,000,000 in the four-year period, has been approved by the Canadian government and is expected to begin before the end of this month.

The satellites will be research vehicles to investigate phenomena in space at altitudes varying from 200 to several thousand miles.

The \$2,000,000 cost of the project will be about the same as the U.S. space agency will spend this year for construction near Ingonish, N.S., of a ground data-gathering station for the Nimbus meteorological satellite system.

Other space projects are in the planning stage. The RCAF has been given authority to begin development of an air portable data-gathering station for the U.S. military space communications system known as Project Aretus.

Title Fight Goes Tonight

BANGKOK (AP) — Masahito (Fighting) Harada of Japan the youngest and smallest world champion, puts his brawny boxing title on the line tonight against the former champion Pone Kingpetch of Thailand.

Harada, only 19 and virtually unknown, won the title from Kingpetch on an 110 round knockout in Tokyo last October. He predicted before the return match that he would knock out the former champion again, this time earlier in the 15-round contest.

Kingpetch, the first Thai boxer ever to win a world title, has vowed to get the title back. He is a 5-4 favorite, although he started an underdog until home town money began to appear.

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Gary Player Takes Lead

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Gary Player of South Africa fired his second straight 65 and took the lead after 36 holes Friday in the \$25,000 San Diego Golf Open.

The powerful 112 7-year-old pro was 130 under-par for the second straight day for a total score of 191 at the halfway mark of the tournament.

The performance left Player one stroke in front of the youthful Jasper Cuptit of Longview, Tex., who had a 65.

Billy Casper Jr., who led in the first round with a 64, settled for a 68 and 132.

Tied with Casper as he finished 116 in the day was Fred Hawkins, who had his second consecutive 66.

Alone at 133 was Tony Lama with a 68. Stan Leonard, of Vancouver, Miller Barber and Phil Rodgers were tied at 138.

The score was the par-35 36-71 Stardust Country Club.
