OTTAWA NEWS. OTTAWA, Nov. 28. The Superior Court of Ontario held today that the Crown proceedings in the Ontario conspiracy case were regular and should not be set aside.

The Privy Council has decided to commute to imprisonment for life the death sentence of Boyver, the Antigonish murderer.

Two more Canadian voyageurs on the Nile have died.

Advice to Fishermen. OTTAWA, Nov. 28. Ex Commissioner of Fisheries Whitcher publishes a letter, holding the view that there is no possibility at present of continuing or renewing in any form the fishery clause of the Washington Treaty.

Dynamiters at Work. DUBLIN, Nov. 28. An attempt was made to destroy with dynamite the residence of Samuel Hussey, at Tralee. The house was badly shattered, as was also the neighboring houses. Hussey is one of the largest land agents in Ireland. He is very unpopular.

Sad Death. HALIFAX, Nov. 28. About six o'clock this evening V. J. Gibson, formerly of St. John, but an Italian by birth, tripped over a spittoon in a saloon, and falling, broke his neck, striking his head on a chair. He was 34 years old.

The Sudan. SUAKIM, Nov. 28. It is reported that Gen. Gordon has recaptured Berber. The rebels continue firing upon Suakim, but always retreat as soon as the gunboat Dolphin opens fire.

Railway Accident. SAN RAFAEL, CAL., Nov. 28. Two men were killed and two badly injured by being struck by a train here today. They were crossing the track in a wagon.

Farmers in Convention. WINNIPEG, Nov. 28. The farmers union has been in session here for two days, transacting various items of business. They report the Northwest farmers very discontented.

Collision. LONDON, Nov. 28. The barque Luke Bruce has been in collision with the steamer Durango in the English Channel. The Durango sank, and twenty persons drowned.

Bank Failure. MIDDLETON, N. Y., Nov. 28. The Middleton National Bank has failed.

MARRIED TO TEN WOMEN.—The trial of Sir Charles E. Neville, Baronet, alias Sir Roger Arthur Tichborne, alias Charles Newbold, charged with bigamy, was resumed at Toledo, Ohio, on the 27th inst. Miss Lillian Whitney, the millionaire music publisher's daughter, of Detroit, who is one of ten wives Neville is alleged to have married, was in court, as was also her father and her mother. They excited some interest among the crowds who flocked into the court. Neville was unconcerned; he told the reporters he was certain to be cleared, and that he would develop some interesting points before the closing of the case. The general opinion is that he is a crank, and that he will be convicted. Miss Whitney is the tenth woman married to Neville.

A large number of guests assembled in honor of the occasion and spent a very pleasant evening with the bride and groom of fifty years ago. London advices says negotiations now being conducted there give some promise of a settlement of the Franco-Chinese difficulty, while a despatch from Shanghai says the Chinese authorities have decided to reject Captain Fournier's May convention as a basis of negotiations.

The governor of Washington Territory says the law conferring the franchise on women and rendering them liable to serve as jurors has been attended with no unfavourable results.

In English:—Orthography, Writing from Dictation, Parsing and Analysis, Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography. The Scholarship is of the annual value of \$125, and will be tenable for three years.
