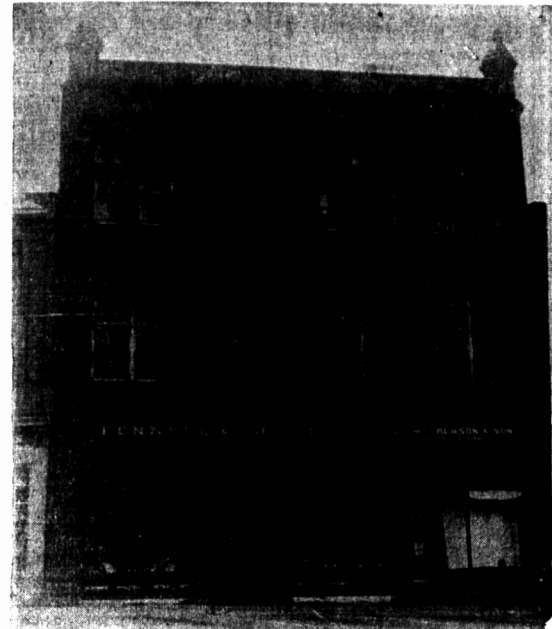

MONDAY

Paying their first visit to Prince Edward Island, the travelling choir from Princeton Theological Seminary were heard in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon and evening by large congregations at Zion Presbyterian and Trinity United Churches.

Under the direction of a professor of music, Dr. David Hugh Jones, F.A.G.O., A.S.C.A.P., the male choir presented a beautiful repertoire of sacred selections. The blend of 15 unaccompanied voices provided effective inspiration for the glorification of God.

Word has been received of the passing on July 11 of Harold Weatherlie of Los Angeles, Calif., in his 75th year. The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Weatherlie of Georgetown, the late Mr. Weatherlie was a construction engineer and had resided in Boston and California since leaving Georgetown fifty years ago. "That John Bertram Knox, came to his death by crushing injuries of the lower abdomen, resulting from the collapse of the undercarriage of aircraft CF-FAJ" was the verdict returned by a coroner's jury at an inquest held last night. Mr. Knox's death occurred at the Charlottetown Airport on the night of July 16th. Coroner L. E. Prowse presided at the inquest. Mr. John P. Nicholson represented the Crown.

The jury further added: "It appears from the evidence presented, the deceased proceeded into a position of danger of his own motivation and met his death in that position due to the fact that safety devices available to him were not in position. In our opinion, no blame should be attached to either the employees or the management."
