"Calf Scramble" Provides Big Attraction At Fair

The Calf Scramble filled the big Jones Livestock Pavilion to the doors and when it was over most people agreed that the fun they had was worth the effort. Twenty boys scrambled for ten calves. The ten who were unsuccessful were called back and let loose on a couple of greased pigs.

But the "pig scramble" proved a disappointment. The pigs, apparently were too small. Certainly they were caught apparently too easily, and most certainly too quickly to suit the several thousand spectators who wanted to see more fun.

The two boys who caught the pigs were David Jenkins of Brackley and Francis Murnaghan of Johnston's River.

The ten boys who caught and won the calves will have to fatten them and enter them in the Provincial Fat Stock Show and Sale next spring, they were told just before the scramble began.

LOTS OF FUN There was a lot of fun, and a few upsets, in the calf scramble although many said they had expected more action from the calves.

Each boy was given a rope halter and he had to catch the calf and halter it before he was declared owner of the calf. Most of the boys caught their animals quickly although some of them had a real tussle before they finally got their halter on the captives.

One of the pluckiest lads in the scramble was the chap who caught his calf by the tail and hung on grimly while the calf dragged him around and around. Finally the boy succeeded in getting a loop of rope around the calf's neck and that was the end of the struggle.

CALF BREAKS LOOSE One of the Hereford calves broke loose from the boy who had captured him although he was apparently halted. From the stand it looked as though the husky whiteface bowled the boy over, and then tramped on him and dragged him until the boy let go the rope. At any rate the calf's freedom was short lived for another lad soon pounced on him and this time the calf stayed captured.

There were Angus calves, Shorthorn calves and Hereford calves in the scramble. They were all steers and will be back again in a different role when the Fat Stock Show is held shortly before Easter next year.

The pig scramble was over almost as soon as it started. The porkers were greased but in each case the boy who got a hand on the pig held on. He had to pick up his pig and carry him to the centre of the arena, grab a bag, put the pig into it and carry the animal out of the arena. Both boys did this very quickly.

Prior to the scramble there was the presentation of trophies and awards won during the week and a parade of some of the cattle that won the special awards.

Added Attractions Increase Attendance At Exhibition

With an estimated attendance of over 50,000 for the week, Exhibition officials expressed the opinion that the Charlottetown Fair which ends tonight is the most largely attended to date. This morning at 10.00 o'clock there will be a tug-of-war between the dairy cattle breeders and the beef cattle breeders.
