Winnipeg Blue Bombers Nip Saskatchewan Team

WINNIPEG (CP) — Winnipeg Blue Bombers held on to a lead created by halfback Dave Raimey's two runs for touchdowns in the second quarter to defeat Saskatchewan Roughriders 15-9 in the Western Football Conference sudden-death semi-final before 21,600 fans Sunday.

The Bombers now meet Calgary Stampeders in a best-of-three final starting in Calgary Saturday.

Raimey, rookie import from the University of Michigan, streaked 90 and 25 yards to create a 14-6 halftime lead for Winnipeg.

Perkins, with 116 yards in 19 thrusts, and Raimey with 40 on nine, led Winnipeg's 196-yard ground attack. The Bombers also hit for 132 yards passing for 16 first downs.

Saskatchewan had 16 first downs on 197 yards passing and 83 rushing. Lancaster completed 12 of 29 passes but had three intercepted.

UNB Bombers Defeat Saints

University of New Brunswick Red Bombers scoring touchdowns in the second and third quarters showed enough offensive power to give them a well-earned 14-0 shutout over St. Dunstan's University here Saturday afternoon to give them a winning season record of four wins and three losses. The setback for the Saints was the fifth in a row and sixth in seven games for the injury battered Saints their worst record in five years.

Fullback Rick Logie's major through centre broke a scoreless deadlock late in the second half to put U.N.B. ahead 6-0 with Bob Cooper adding the convert point. Then early in the second half the Bombers added their second of the game after making big gains on the ground. MacPherson ran and a neat sweep around end and Cooper again made the convert.

Chicago Whips Leafs 9-0; Montreal & Rangers Win

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks poured five goals past Terry Sawchuk in the first period, then cruised to a 9-0 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs here Sunday night.

By extending their season mark to five victories and a tie, the Hawks remained tied with Montreal for first place in the National Hockey League. The Canadiens beat Boston 5-2 Sunday night.

Toronto fell into a fourth place tie with Detroit, two points behind New York Rangers.

Rousseau and Claude Larose scored for the Canadiens. Boston's two goals came from Reg Fleming and Johnny Bucyk in a late surge that was fruitless. Fleming scored at 12:11 and Bucyk at 14:23 of the third period, but by that time the Canadiens had scored all their goals.

Only the spectacular goaltending of rookie Bernie Parent in the Boston net kept the score from reaching double figures. Then he again he foiled Canadiens on breakaways. Three of the Montreal goals came after multiple rebound shots while Boston defencemen stood idly by.

The game was a tight checking affair until Boston found itself short-handed at the 10-minute mark of the first period. Then the Canadiens' power play went into high gear, firing Boston's defence and turning the tide of play.

Shortly after defenceman Teddy Green was put in the penalty box for the second time in the period the Canadiens put pressure on Parent. At one point they had six slaps at the puck while Parent was on the ice and he stopped all of them. But then Rousseau broke through with a short back-hander that was stopped by Parent but bounced back off a defenceman trying to help the goalie.

Ingarfield split the Detroit defence and skated in on Crozier, who blocked his drive. Then, from his knees, Ingarfield shuffled the puck to Marshall who tucked it into the right corner.

Howe, given a perfect pass from Don McKinney, shot a 30-foot bullet over Giacomini's left shoulder for Detroit's first score. The goal was Howe's second of the season and left him three short of the 600 mark in this, his 20th NHL season.

The Wings sent five forwards against Giacomini in the last five minutes and their attack paid off when McDonald fired another 30-foot blazer through a maze of players after taking Howe's pass.

Bobby Hull took over the league scoring lead by coming up with his second three-goal performance of the year. His first also came against Toronto in the season opener. The goals ran his total to 11 in six games. He also added a pair of assists to overtake Bob Rousseau, 17 points to 15.

Hull's performance also put him atop the list of the Hawks' all-time scorers. Bobby, in his ninth season, now has scored a total of 554 points. The record had been held by Bill Mosienko, who collected 549 points in 13 seasons with the Hawks.

LAUNCH ATTACK

The Hawks launched their attack at 6:38 of the first period when Phil Esposito backhanded a rebound of Chico Maki's shot past Sawchuk from 15 feet out. Less than a minute later, Eric Nesterenko flipped in a 10-footer after taking a neat pass from left wing Len Lunde. Chicago's Doug Mohns was in the penalty box when Maki made it 3-0, climbing a two-on-one breakaway with Hull at 10:42.

Mohns knocked a five-footer behind Sawchuk less than four minutes later and Bill Hay capped the outburst at 18:39 by skating through the entire Leaf team and sliding the puck into the cage from a few feet away.

Hull scored twice and Stan Mikita hit for his second marker of the season in the second period. Hull's final tally came midway in the third frame.

Hawks' goalie Glenn Hall, who blanked the Leafs in the league opener in Toronto, turned aside 40 shots in registering his second whitewash job of the year.

NEW YORK 3 DETROIT 2

NEW YORK (AP) — Bob Nevin drilled in two goals as New York Rangers edged Detroit in a National Hockey League game.

The Rangers, who didn't win a game from Detroit at home last season, ran their current unbeaten string to four games by taking a 3-0 lead and holding off a late surge by the Wings' Gordie Howe.

Howe scored one goal and set up another as the Wings peppered rookie Goale Ed Giacomin in the last period. The Detroit ace ruined Giacomin's bid for his first NHL shutout at 2:44 of the third period. He fed Ed McDonald for a last-minute goal before Giacomin closed the gates.

Nevin scored his first goal with the Rangers short-handed in the opening period. His second came on a New York power play in the second period. Donnie Marshall completed the Rangers scoring with another power-play goal in the middle period.

SCORES ON REBOUND

The Rangers' Wayne Hillman was serving a penalty late in the first period when Nevin took a pass from Marshall, fired a hard drive off goalie Roger Crozier's pads and punched in his own rebound with Crozier sprawled on the ice. Harry Howell also drew an assist on the Ranger captain's third goal of the season as the Wings' Pete Goegan of the Wings was in the penalty box when Nevin scored again, this time on a short backhander after he had faked defenceman Bill Gadsby in front of the Detroit nets.

ISLAND GOLFERS MIGHT GO

FREDERICTON (CP) — The 1966 tournament of the New Brunswick — Prince Edward Island Golf Association will be held at the Moncton golf and country club and the Maritime open will be played at the Fredericton golf club it was decided here Sunday at the fall meeting of the Association's board of governors.

The Riverside Country Club was selected as site of the N.B. — P.E.I. junior championship.

The association's full list of tournament dates and sites will be completed at the spring meeting at Moncton.

The possibility that Prince Edward Island will withdraw from its association with New Brunswick was raised by Bob Gigsey of Charlottetown, who said he had started investigation of such a step through informal correspondence with the Royal Canadian Golf Association. He said he would like to see the Island province represented by its own teams in the Willingdon Cup competition and the Canadian Junior Team matches.

Ellwood Greenough of St. Stephen, president of the association, said he would not like to see P.E.I. withdraw from its long association with New Brunswick. He and other governors expressed the view that such a step might result in a lower standard of golf on the island in the future if the P.E.I. players did not face the challenge of competition from players in New Brunswick.

B.W. Isner of Moncton, a past president of the association, said a more progressive step would be the formation of a Maritime team to compete in the Willingdon Cup matches. The combined team from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island finished second to last in this year's tournament at Winnipeg, but a Maritime team would be strong enough to compete with the best teams in Canada.

The governors paid tribute to the memory of Cecil Peake, a longtime governor of the association from the Lakeside club in Moncton who made a major contribution to golf over the years. Mr. Peake died in the summer.
